THE CLASS OF 1975 MEMORIAL CEREMONY

The Class of 1975 Memorial Ceremony is conducted this year as part of the 40th Reunion and provides an opportunity for the graduate community to honor and remember those classmates who have passed away.

The first ceremony of this type occurred in 1964 with a memorial service in the Cadet Chapel. In 1965 the ceremony was changed to a formation on the terrazzo, and then returned to the Chapel in 1990 for classes celebrating their 25th or later reunion. This year's memorial ceremony, conducted in the Cadet Chapel, will be highlighted by a roll call of deceased classmates. As each deceased class member's name and squadron are called out, a classmate responds, "Absent, sir." Following the roll call, the ceremony will close by a moment of silence, the Air Force hymn and benediction.

This memorial ceremony is dedicated to those members of the Class of 1975 who have gone before us. It is a time to embrace the memories of our fallen classmates. In this ceremony, we recognize our departed classmates, and celebrate as a community the experiences that made us the USAF Academy Class of 1975 and carried forward into our lives to this day.

Lord Guard and Guide The Men Who Fly


Lord guard and guide the men who fly Through the great spaces of the sky; Be with them traversing the air In darkening storms or sunshine fair.

THE WAR MEMORIAL

The War Memorial stands on the terrazzo on the north end of the Air Gardens and faces the American flag for which the deceased graduates listed on the memorial died. The memorial is a striking curved monolith constructed of three 7'x21' slabs of black starlite granite. The inscription "In memory of our fellow graduates who have fallen in battle ..." is a simple but eloquent statement of why a name is inscribed on the memorial. The criteria for being remembered on the War Memorial are:

- 1. Graduates who died from direct hostile action.
- 2. Graduates who died within an area of conflict as the result of an incident which was in direct support of the conflict.
- 3. Graduates who died outside an area of conflict while directly supporting the activities within that area will be considered on an individual basis by the Board of Directors of the Association of Graduates.

At the dedication ceremony in 1970, Brigadier General Robin Olds, Commandant of Cadets, brought the essence of the memorial forcefully home with the following words:

This monolith of simple beauty contains the names of graduates of the Air Force Academy who have given their lives in combat. Each was a gallant man, devoted to his country and proud of his heritage. Each died bravely, as one's country sometimes calls upon her sons to do. Remember these names. Honor them. They are a part of you, the Wing. They represent your past, as you today represent our future. Reflect on their example of selfless devotion to duty and gain courage so that when you face your test, you may add honor and glory to the annals of the Wing—and of the Air Force—and of our country.

There are presently 182 graduates listed on the War Memorial.

Located north of the Class of '59 Challenge Bridge at Doolittle Hall is a replica of the War Memorial. The replica, a gift from the Class of 1970, was completed and set in place in May 2004.

Memorial Locations – Cadets and graduates may be memorialized in several different locations at the Academy. The names of those who die on active duty are placed on plaques just outside the Cadet Catholic Chapel. Names of other deceased graduates may also be found on the plaque at the Memorial Tree Grove located just East of Doolittle Hall, in the memorial section of the Academy cemetery, or on a memorial paver at Doolittle Hall. Graduates who died as a result of combat action are memorialized on the War Memorial.

For the 40th reunion, the graves of USAFA '75 GBNF at the Academy cemetery have been decorated with American flags and class coins at the markers. A searchable electronic directory of specific grave locations is available in the small building at the southwest corner of the cemetery, provided by the AOG.

THE MEMORIAL PAVILION

Since the inception of the Air Force Academy, our graduates have willingly laid down their lives in the line of service to our great nation. It is the right of every graduate to be buried—with military honors—here at the Academy cemetery. During much of the year, Colorado's unpredictable weather can turn memorial services into punishing ordeals, wrought with rain, snow and ice. These conditions only add to a grieving family's mental anguish, often making it difficult to lay their loved ones to rest. Seeking a solution to the Academy's unforgiving climate, the classes of 1966, 1981, 1983, 1984 and others, through the assistance of the Association of Graduates, constructed the Memorial Pavilion at the Academy Cemetery to accommodate funeral services on this sacred ground. The Memorial Pavilion provides both indoor and outdoor settings where families may conduct the time-honored ritual of saying goodbye to their loved ones. Today, it is a place of dignity and respect for graveside services held either outdoors in a quiet, peaceful mountain setting, or inside, protected from Colorado's unpredictable weather. Located on the north side of the cemetery, the Memorial Pavilion comfortably seats 100-150 guests with facilities to accommodate reflection and viewings. Adjacent to the east wall there is a columbarium appropriate for interment of urns.

DIRECTORY BUILDING

The directory building is located near the west entrance to the cemetery so that grave sites can be easily located. It includes a record locator room that houses a touch screen information center. The system can show visitors the exact location of every grave and how to find them. A selection titled "Gone But Not Forgotten" provides guests specific information about each of our honored dead. Those buried here may be located by class year, last name, or cadet squadron. Information presented includes a cadet photograph, class year and a biographical tribute, complimented by a respectful rendition of Taps. The system also lists USAFA graduates honored on the War Memorial.
