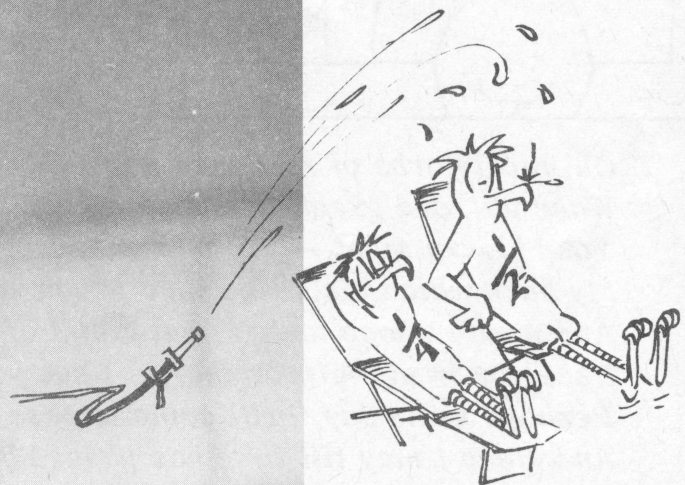
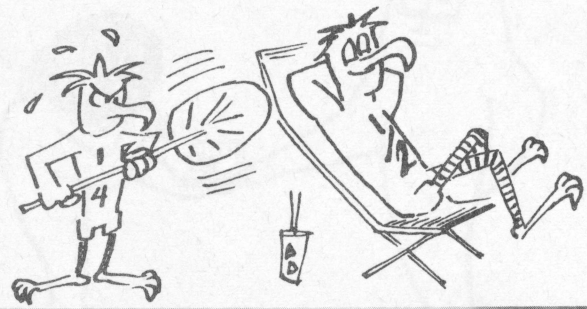
About the cover:

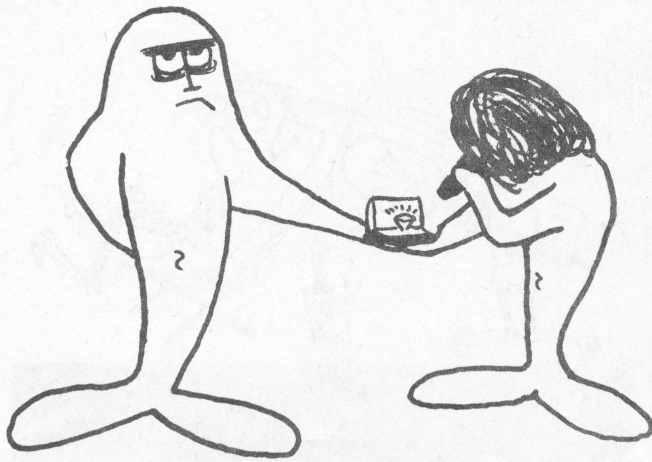

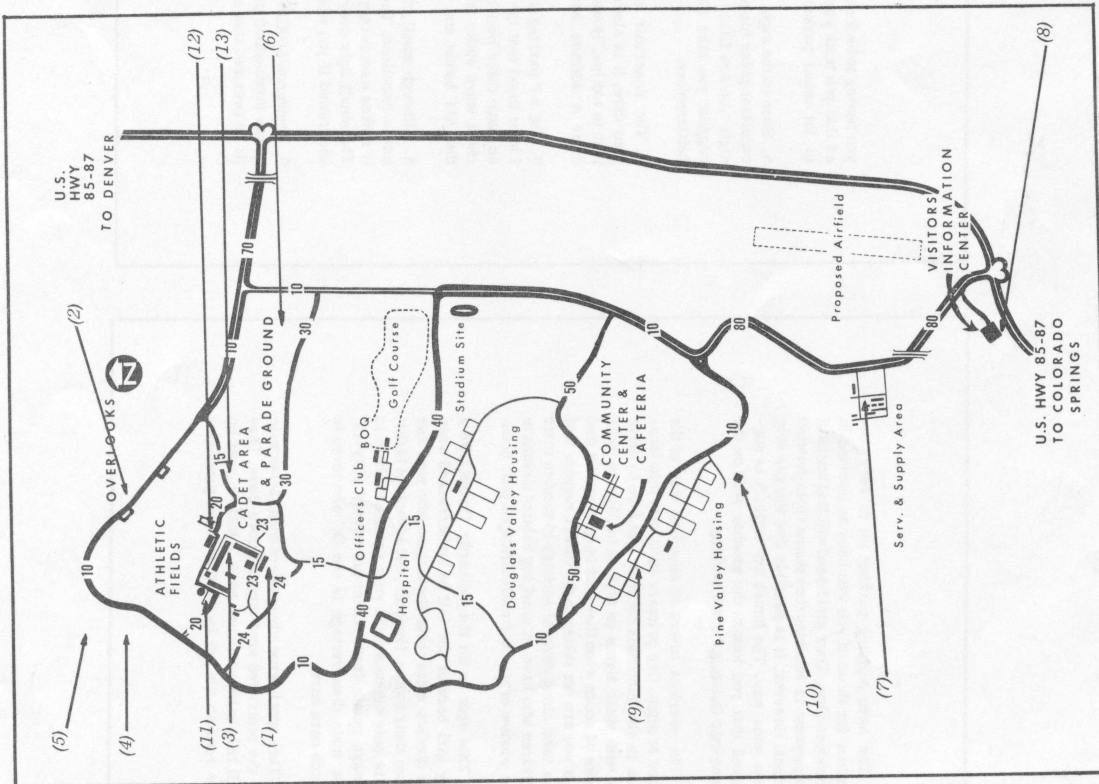
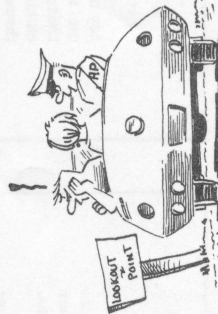
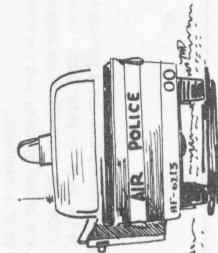
*UPON LOOKING IN MY MIRROR BEFORE

PARKERS GUIDE



A convenient guide to select parking prepared by competent staff experts in extensive research. This guide is the complete list of known and unknown parking places around the Academy. 1. The Aero building parking lot is very convenient for those of you who have an interest in Aerodynamics. Your girl friend will find hours of amusement in watching the exhaust from the wind tunnel. However, it is possible that the gas may blow your way. The fumes are toxic. It is suggested that you look at the weather vane on the Academic Building before parking.

2. The overlook offers an excellent view of the Area at night. One primary fault with this location is the numerous tourists that love to drive by with their lights on high beam.
