# Today's Game | AIR FORCE vs RUTGERS

One of the top running backs in the nation will be at Falcon Stadium this afternoon.

He is J. J. Jennings, the 6-1, 216-pound senior from Rutgers who enters today's contest with some of the best rushing and scoring statistics of any college football player in the nation.

Through the first seven games of the season, Jennings has rushed for 983 yards on 217 carries and has scored 17 touchdowns, best mark in the nation.

Jennings has rushed for at least 100 yards in every game this season and will be trying to make it eight in a row today.

Last season, Jennings ranked ninth nationally in rushing and ran for 1,287 yards and carried 287 times, making him a pretty busy athlete for the Scarlet Knights.

\* \* \* \* \*

Although Rutgers has been playing college football since 1869 (they started the game along with Princeton) this is the first time the Scarlet Knights have ever played this far West and the first time they have ever met the Falcons.

The Falcons will make a visit to New Brunswick, N.J., next year to complete the present contract.

\* \* \* \* \*

One of the most interested spectators at today's game will be Lt. Col. Anthony Cillo, Air Force assistant athletic director who graduated from Rutgers in 1952, earning three lacrosse letters and also playing football.

\* \* \* \* \*

Last week's 43-10 Air Force victory over Army was one of the most satisfying in school history and gave the Falcons a 4-3-1 lead in the series. It also gave the Falcons a 1-1 mark in interservice competition this season.

A lot of credit for the victory should go to the defense, which intercepted three passes. Never before in Falcon football history have interceptions played such a vital role in a game and all three pass thefts wound up putting points on the scoreboard.

Middle guard Dave Lawson started it off by intercepting a pass and returning it 21 yards to set up a touchdown. A little later, rover Steve Heil picked off a pass and returned it 16 yards for a score. Then defensive end Paul DeHart ran 32 yards for a touchdown on another pass interception.

It was a great effort. Now the Falcons will have to turn their attention to the running attack of Rutgers and J. J. Jennings.

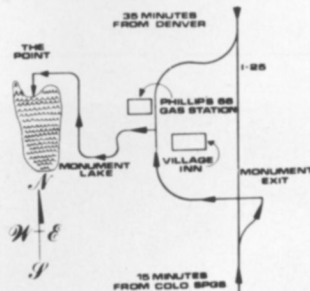

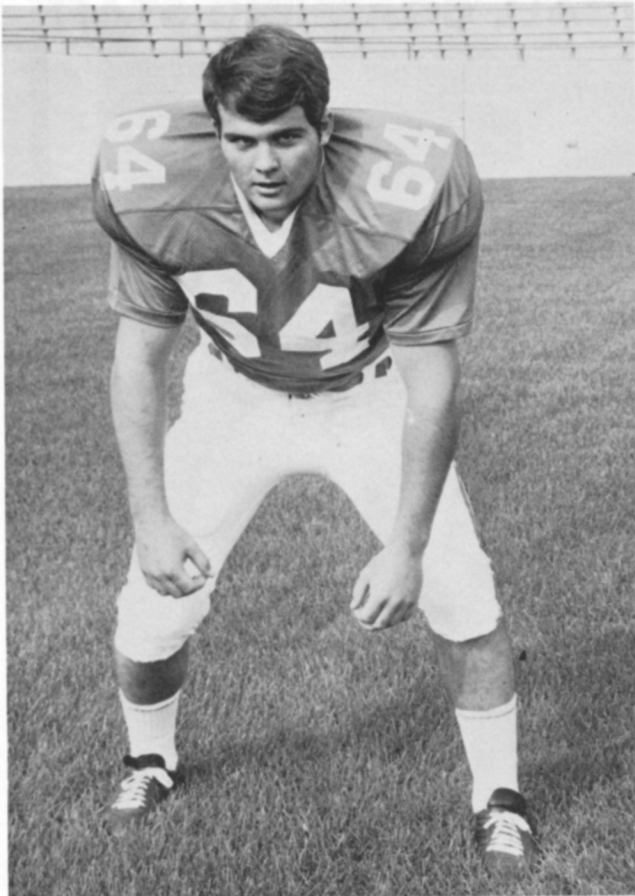

# DAVE LAWSON

**6-1, 211-pound sophomore  
linebacker-kicker  
from Shawnee Mission, Kan.**

Starting middle guard and placekicker for the Falcons, he was one of the few Air Force athletes to play varsity football as a freshman. Has already recovered three fumbles this year and caused two others with his hard hitting. He is also among the top five tacklers on the team. Last year, used mostly as a placekicker, he converted 28 of 29 extra point attempts and eight of 15 field goal tries. Has connected on seven field goals this year in twelve attempts. His longest field goal was 45 yards against New Mexico earlier in the season. Had his best day as a Falcon against Army last week, kicking three field goals, including a 48-yarder, second best in Air Force history. He also intercepted a pass and returned it 21 yards to the one-yard line.

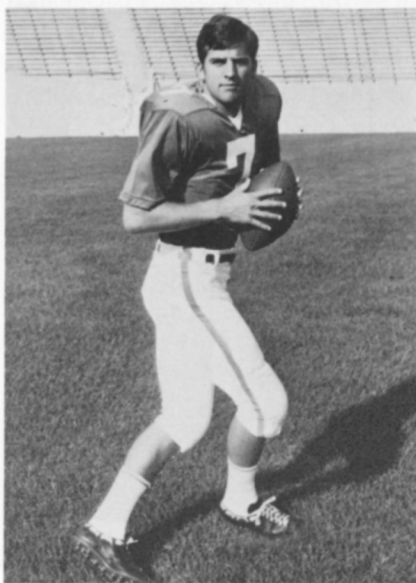

Has excellent speed as evidenced by his high school track letter as a sprinter. His father is a retired Air Force lieutenant colonel.



**JOHN HAZEN**, 6-3, 210-pound sophomore offensive guard from Lake Oswego, Ore. Plays behind Lance Webb at the left guard slot. Rated as one of the offensive linemen on the squad. Lettered in track and wrestling as well as football in high school. His father lettered years as an end at Nebraska.

**BOB THOMPSON**, 5-11, 172-pound junior cornerback from El Cajon, Calif. Switched from quarterback to cornerback early in the season and has made impressive progress playing behind Ken Vaughn. # RUTGERS UNIVERSITY

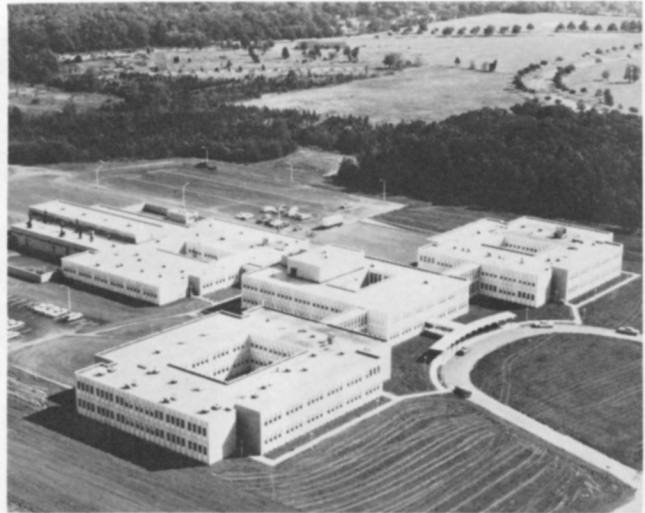
Rutgers University traces its beginnings to 1766 as one of eight American colleges founded prior to the Revolutionary War. First called Queen's College and later renamed Rutgers for Colonel Henry Rutgers, the College grew to become the land-grant college for New Jersey in 1864, a university in 1924, and the State University of New Jersey in 1945. Rutgers University now includes full-time undergraduate colleges in the Camden, Newark, and New Brunswick areas and graduate schools and evening divisions throughout the state.

Each student at Rutgers University enjoys membership in a small to moderate-sized college community which has its own identity, traditions, special programs, and philosophy. ## Stadium Information

### LOST AND FOUND

If you lose an article while attending a game at Falcon Stadium, check at the main ticket office in the east building or the main concessions office on the top tier of the west side. If you find an article in the stadium area, please turn it in to any of the concession stands, the main ticket office or the main concessions office.

### FIRST AID

Trained medical personnel are in attendance at all Air Force home games. In case of any emergency, report it immediately to the head usher in your portal. There are two first aid rooms and two first aid stations located in Falcon Stadium. The rooms are located in the east side building and on the third tier of the west side, directly under the press box. The stations are located off the walkways of the first and second tiers in the vicinity of the 50-yard line.

### EMERGENCY CALLS

Individuals expecting emergency calls should file their portal section, row and seat number with the command post, located in the east side building. Office number is 472-1151. A call number will then be issued. **No special announcements are made over the public address system except in cases of gravest emergency. Please do not request this service needlessly.**

## STADIUM FACTS

For natural beauty, Falcon Stadium is hard to surpass. Built into the base of the Rampart Range mountains, the modern facility also is one of the most functional sports structures in the country.

The concrete structure, built in a natural bowl, has 49,068 permanent seats and can hold up to 50,000 spectators with additional temporary bleachers. There is one level of seats on the east side and three tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession stands and restroom areas. All seats are within easy walking distance of the 9,610-vehicle capacity parking lot which surrounds the stadium on three sides.

The stadium is easily accessible from divided U. S. Interstate 25 and the Academy's Stadium Boulevard which leads directly to the parking lot. There is also ample parking space for 300 commercial busses, and a rail siding is located just a few hundred yards from the bowl for special trains.

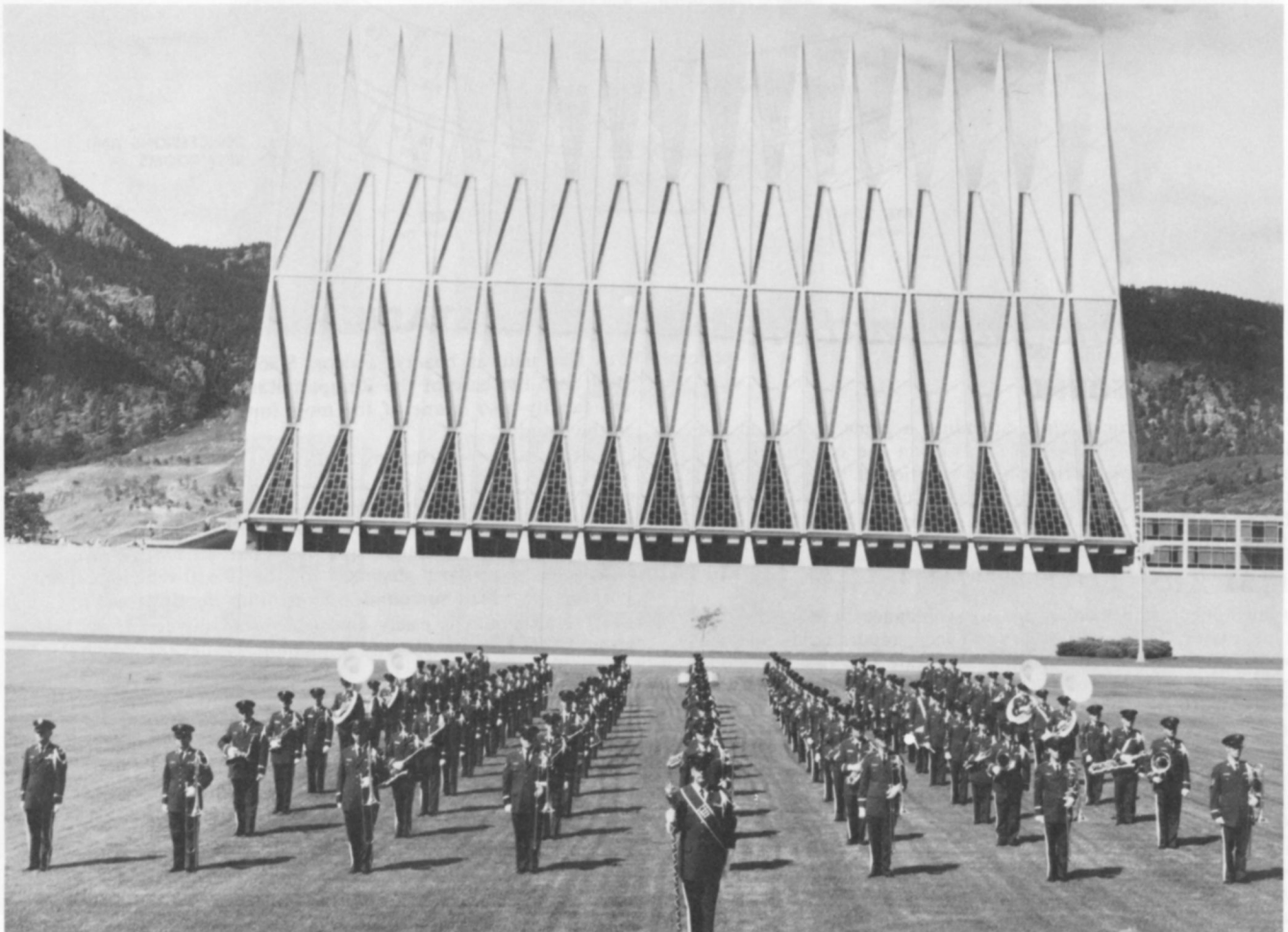

# NINE LETTERMEN LEAD CAGERS

Coach Hank Egan and his 1973-74 basketball team open the season three weeks from today with nine returning lettermen and an optimistic attitude for the coming campaign.

Last year, the Falcons posted a 14-10 record, first winning season in seven years, and wound up fourth defensively in the nation.

Among the top returnees are senior team captain Rich Nickelson, last year's leading scorer with a 16.4 points per game average, and junior Jim Eken, second leading scorer with an 11.2 average and the top rebounder with a 6.7 average.

Nickelson (6-5) and Eken (6-4) are the only returning starters but sophomores Greg Schneider (6-6) and Mike Sevier (6-5) both lettered on the front line last season and should play greater roles this season.

"Our main concern is looking at the backcourt spots," said Egan, starting his third season as Falcon head coach.

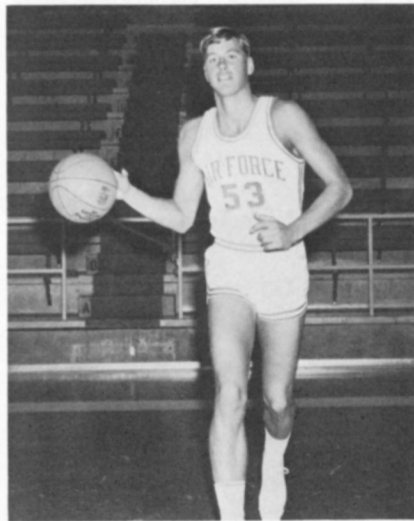
"We lost both starters from last season but we feel we have some excellent prospects. It will take us several weeks before we can make a determination on the freshmen prospects."

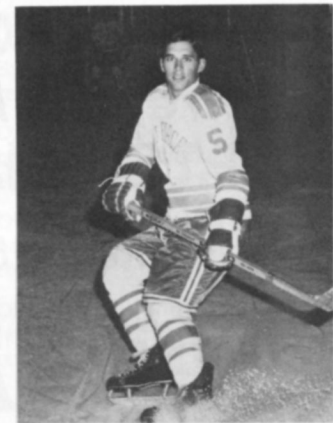
Only three experienced defensemen, Gerry Micheletti, Todd Zejdlik and Tim Kline, return. The remaining defensemen were still in question.

# NCAA Sponsors 33 National Championships

The 1973-74 intercollegiate athletic season will mark the first time in history that the NCAA will hold national championships in three divisions. In addition to the first-ever championships in National Collegiate Division III, the coming season also marks the 90th anniversary for the



National Collegiate Tennis Championship. This is the oldest National Collegiate Championship contested. It was held for the first time in 1883.

Two other firsts will occur in 1973-74. The NCAA will crown its first football champions in Divisions II and III, and lacrosse will be contested for a national championship in Division II for the first time.

The new divisional make-up of the Association, which was established at a Special Convention in August 1973, will increase in number the more than 7,500 student-athletes who now compete annually in NCAA-sponsored events. Through the years, over 6,100 competitors representing 234 institutions have earned the coveted title of "National Collegiate Champion." # College Football "Plays It Again" Sunday

As it is popularly conceived, the instant replay is a split-screened, isolated, slo-mo, stop-action piece of art which lets you see the play you didn't see a few seconds earlier.

But popular conceptions are far too confining. An instant replay—in every sense of the term—takes place every Sunday morning on most ABC stations. It even has a name—ABC College Football Highlights Show.

Putting the Sunday morning highlights show together is a game in itself; and when you consider that the "working day" in Chicago for the show is 11 p.m. Saturday until 11 a.m. Sunday, you can bet it's the only game in town.

For at least three members of the Highlights Show team, it's an away game. Dick Snider, director of NCAA Films and executive producer of the show, checks into Chicago Saturday night from his home in Wichita, Kan. Kemper Peacock, the producer-director, journeys from New York; and Bill Flemming, the host, comes from his assignment on ABC's college football telecast of the week.

Snider minimizes his role in the production, but the five-year reign of the show is to his credit. "You know, the whole thing's impossible," he confesses. "The good thing is that we never have time to stop and think about that when we are putting the show together."

Snider's involvement with the show really begins the Monday before. That's when he huddles with ABC executives to determine what games will be featured.

"We'll film on the average of 12 games a weekend, and then pick the five or six top games. Those games are determined on the importance of the contest, logistics or even if one of the teams has a player everybody would like to see.

"The most important thing about the show," Snider continued, "is getting the film into Chicago. When I get there Saturday night, I contact the cameramen and find out what flights the film's going to be on. Then I make sure that our messengers—who race to O'Hare and Midway airports on motorcycles—get out there and get the film.

## Important Motorcycles

"Kemper Peacock has been all over the world and has to be one of the best in the business, Bill Flemming has covered every major sporting event in the world, and I've been around a little, too; but we all are helpless if one of those guys in a helmet and leather jacket can't get his bike started."

In the five years the show has been on the air, only one shipment of film has been lost in transit. "I know the plane schedules into Chicago better than the airlines," says Snider, "but sometimes things go wrong. We had an important game coming in from the South on Piedmont Airlines. It arrived on time, but the messenger didn't, and Piedmont closed down its baggage counter. We had to call Piedmont's home office, get the manager's name

"Physically exhausting"

in Chicago, get him out of bed and down to O'Hare."

Kemper Peacock is the head of a production company by the same name. "I know I'm good with deadlines but this is ridiculous," Peacock said as he sat at a desk surrounded by some of his own photography. "It's tough, but we get it done. I work with three editors in Chicago on the show. I'll edit the main game—the one we spotlight—and the rest of the work is parcelled out to the others. We have roughly four hours to do the work . . . and we do it. That's all."

Each cameraman provides a play-by-play account of the game with the film. It's up to Peacock to edit the footage into an exciting, five-minute piece.

"At 4:30 a.m. we transfer the material from film to video-tape and have our first run through. Bill Flemming arrives on the scene between 5:30 and 6 a.m.; and we must have the show completed by 10 a.m. We have roughly three hours to get everything right. We have the edited film and any other features that I might have worked on in New York that we have to get into the show. But, Bill's got to get his narration in; and we have late scores to include. You know, it just might be impossible."

WLS, the ABC affiliate in Chicago, has to have the show by 10 a.m. to insure at least one run through. But, the station has been persuaded to take the show later.

## Show Must Go On

"Our record is 10:57," Peacock admitted. "WLS had 'Water Skiing from Cypress Garden' all racked up, ready to run. But, we made it. We've made every show."

The "interior linemen" of the show are the writers. Jeff Elliott, who doubles as the assistant director of the Big Ten Service Bureau, and Kay Schultz, Chicago journalist, spend their time looking over shoulders and getting people out of bed.

"I just try to compile as much information as possible," Elliott explains, "and when you work through the night, that means disturbing some people."

Flemming is the man up front. According to Snider, "He is super. He's one of the few sportscasters who could do this show. He knows the game, and you can't shake him up."

Flemming smiled at this comment and said, "They do call me 'one-shot Flemming.' Let's face it, that's my strength. I can get the thing done in one take. And fifty per cent of the time, that's all we have time for."

Flemming is on the college football scene every Saturday afternoon working a game for ABC. After the game he hops into his own plane and heads for Chicago.

"Flying my own plane is the only way to do it," says Flemming. "Even so, sometimes I have to leave at half-time, or before, to make it. It's amazing, but I've never been weathered out. I've had some bumpy flights, but Chicago has always been open for me."

Upon arrival in Chicago, Flemming reads the first edition of the Tribune to get a bead on some of the games. Preparation is his hallmark. He compiles information throughout the week on the games which will probably be used then adlibs this information during the taping of the show.

After getting a wake-up call at 4:30 a.m., Flemming heads over to begin the taping. He gets the script outline then the cameras roll. Often the narration is material Flemming is seeing for the first time.

"I think this is an advantage," he says. "I put everything into the present tense. It's like I'm announcing the game for the first time. To us, the game isn't in the past."

## Flemming Cares

Flemming is a perfectionist. "With Bill you have to be prepared," says Elliott. "If he sees a name he's never seen before, he wants to know how to pronounce it. His standard line is 'Are you sure?' I'd hate to tell you how many times we've run to a phone at 6 a.m. to check out a pronunciation, a statistic, a record or even a home town."

Peacock rolls the cameras at 6 a.m., and Flemming begins reading. If he makes a mistake, the film is still rolled because the important item is to get all the film onto video-tape. After that is accomplished, then the backtracking is done. When Flemming is happy with the script and is sure that everything is correct, he proceeds in his one-shot fashion.

The result is an exciting football show, which provides information—an entertaining news show.

"The show is good," Flemming claims, "and I can tell you why. We have a great team, and we all 'dig' college football."

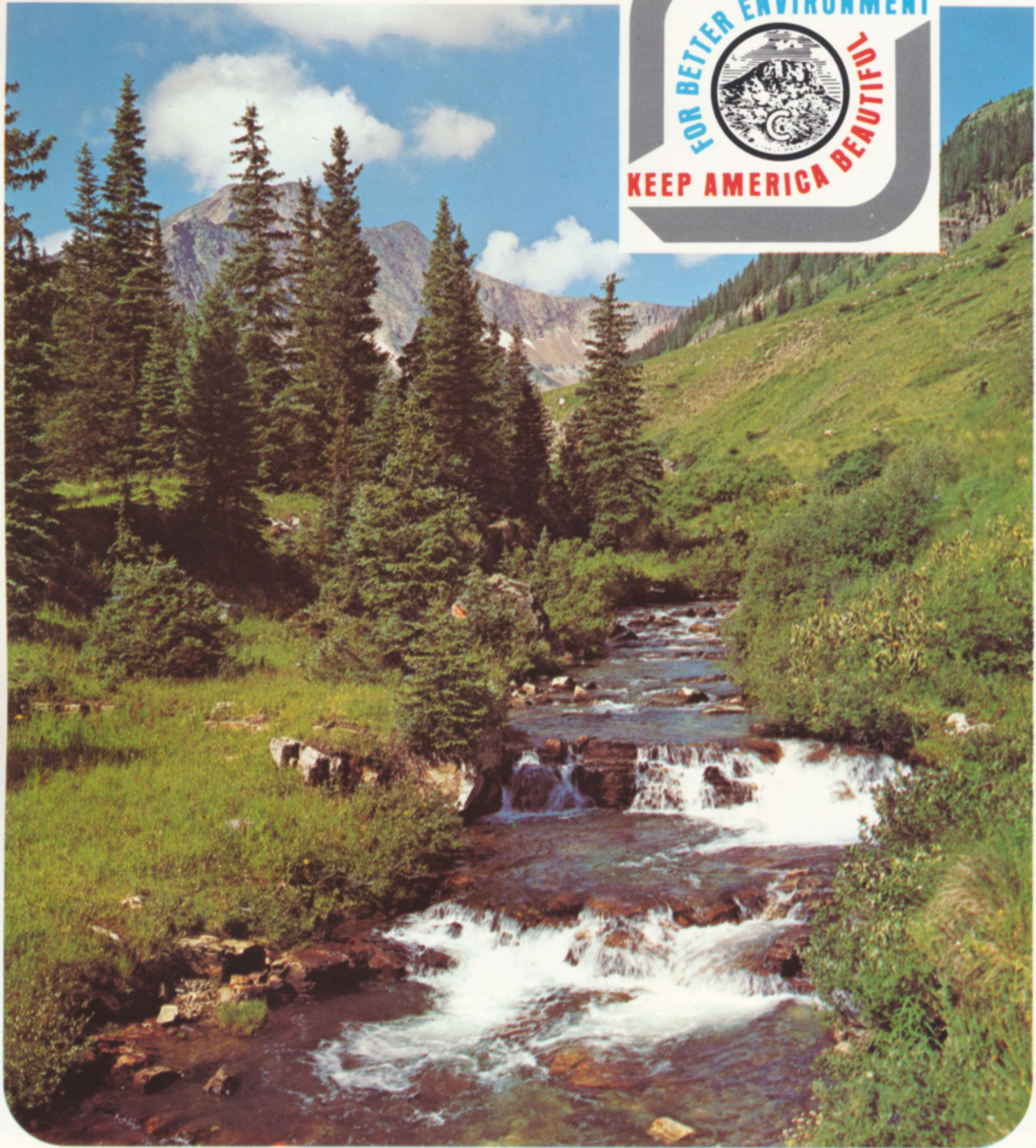
The 12-hour period which spawns the Sunday Morning College Football Highlights Show is summed up by Flemming: "Physically exhausting."

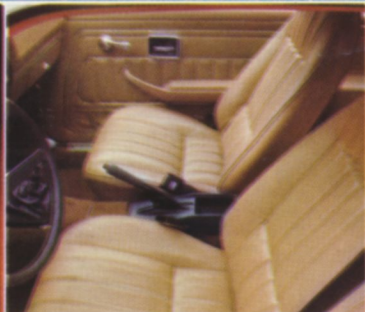
