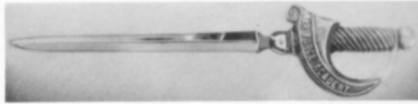

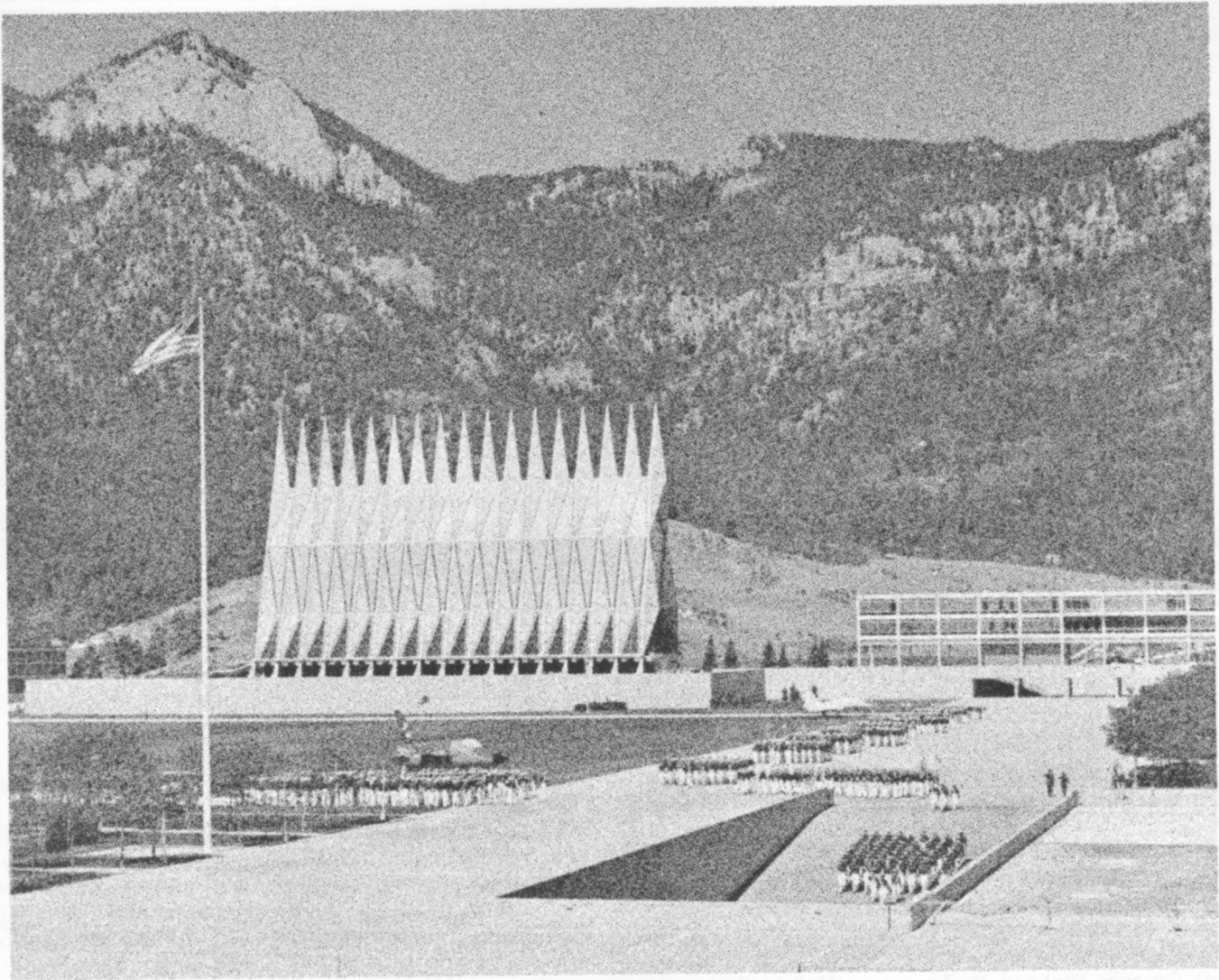

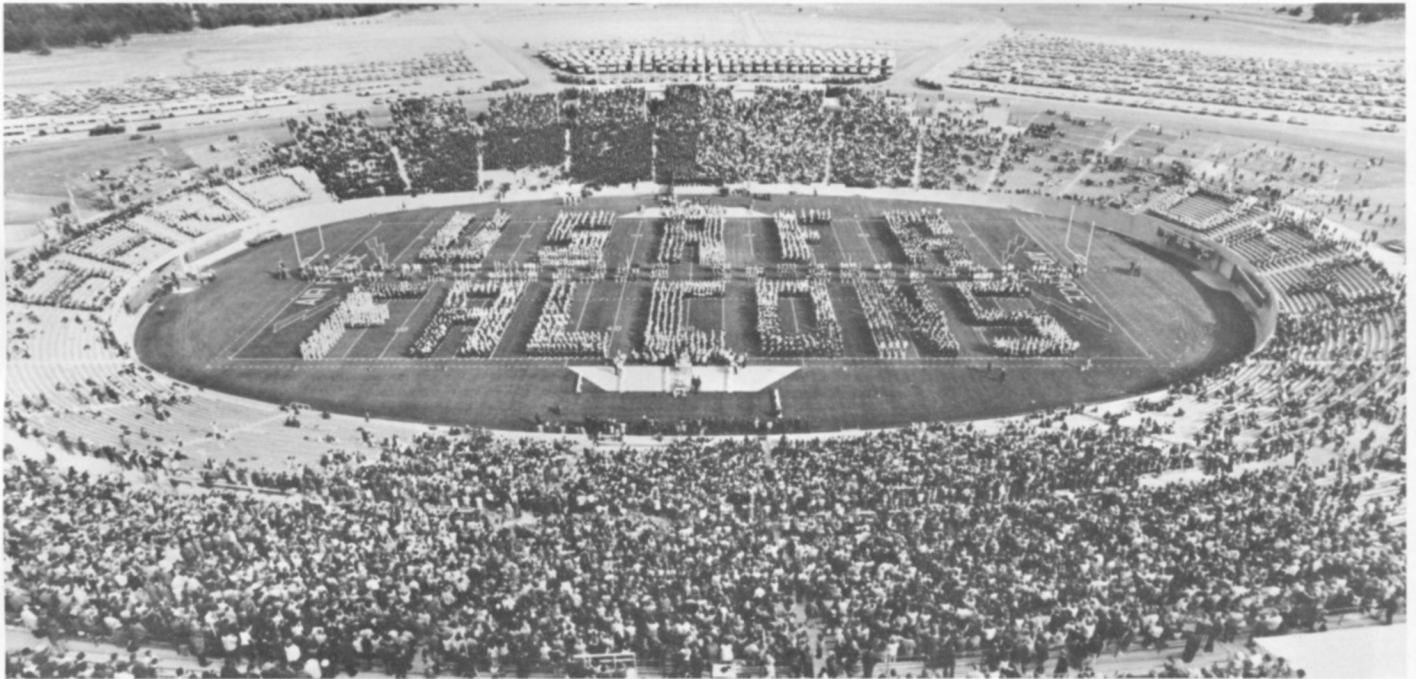

## MUSIC, FOOTBALLS TO FILL THE AIR

Band Day 1974 will feature an expected 80 bands from six states including Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, New Mexico, North Dakota and Wyoming. Theme for the day is "Music - Americana."

Since its conservative inception with 12 bands in 1970 involving some 1,200 young high school bandsmen, Band Day has been a huge success with the football fans and young bandsmen alike. Band Day was originated with the approval and assistance of Lieutenant Colonel Richard E. Thurston, United States Air Force Academy Band commander and conductor, and Senior Master Sergeant William A. Stokes, who plans and organizes all the countless details for this day of music.

In five years, the project has grown to include 80 bands involving more than 13,000 young bandsmen for this year's halftime performance.

Today's event is a non-competitive attraction with each participating band having the same opportunity to perform and to receive the same recognition regardless of size or geographical location. For 1974, invitations were extended to bands throughout Colorado and to adjacent out-of-state bands.

The primary objectives of the Band Day program are to enhance Air Force Community Relations by providing all the participating bands with a musical and educational experience; to provide an opportunity for bands to visit the Air Force Academy; and to present a large and different halftime show for Falcon fans.

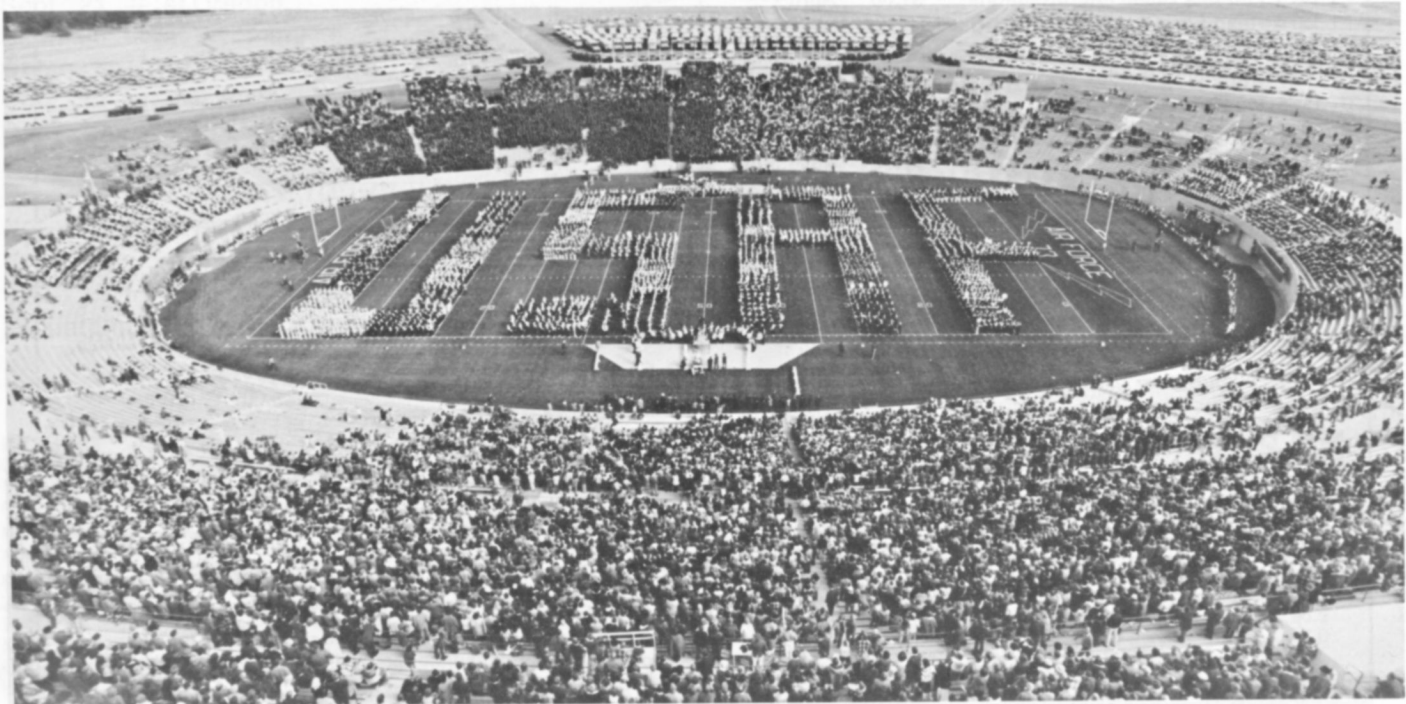

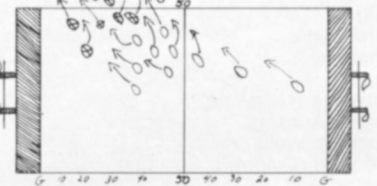

# Today's Game | AIR FORCE VS IDAHO

Air Force today opens its 19th football season and the 13th in Falcon Stadium. There have been a great many thrills in that period but more are waiting for Falcon fans with the start of another football season this afternoon.

It is with particular pleasure that we welcome the thousands of high school bandsmen here today for the fifth annual Band Day. This event has grown rapidly since its start in 1970 and is now recognized as one of the finest in the nation. Such an event takes a lot of planning so when the bands mass on the field at halftime a lot of credit goes to SMSgt. William Stokes of the Air Force Academy Band, who directed the planning for this event.

Welcome, high school musicians. We hope you have enjoyed your stay at the Air Force Academy.

Idaho returns to Falcon Stadium for the first time in four years today. The last time the two teams met the Falcons scored a 45-7 victory in the 1970 season opener but preseason prospects indicate a much tougher game today.

Idaho has a new coach and a new offensive system. Ed Troxel, the Vandals' new coach, is celebrating a homecoming of sorts. He graduated from high school in nearby Colorado Springs.

Troxel also has installed this year the Veer-T to take advantage of the Vandals' running strength.

Air Force holds a 2-0 lead in the series but Idaho feels they will be much improved over last season when it had a 4-7 record.

The Falcons of Air Force also will have somewhat of a new look this season with Rich Haynie, all-time service academy yardage maker, now graduated.

His apparent to Haynie's vacated post is junior Mike Worden, a lefthander from Lakewood, Calif., who lettered as Haynie's understudy last season. Worden took over as the number one quarterback in spring drills and he has been there ever since.

Worden didn't see much action last season but has shown in fall drills that he is versatile and is effective either running or throwing.

In the final fall scrimmage last Saturday, Worden rushed for 73 yards and passed for 77, running for one touchdown and passing for another. That's about as balanced as you can get and it should add more diversity to the Falcon offensive attack this fall.

Co-captains for the Falcons this fall will be senior offensive guard Larry Fariss of Medford, Ore., and senior defensive tackle Terry Young of Green Bay, Wis.

Both players are exceptional linemen and should contribute greatly to the success of the team this fall. Fariss is 6-0 and 221 pounds while Young isn't hard to miss on the field. At 6-7 he is the tallest player in Falcon football history.

Early season prospects indicate it should be another exciting season and that excitement will start this afternoon.

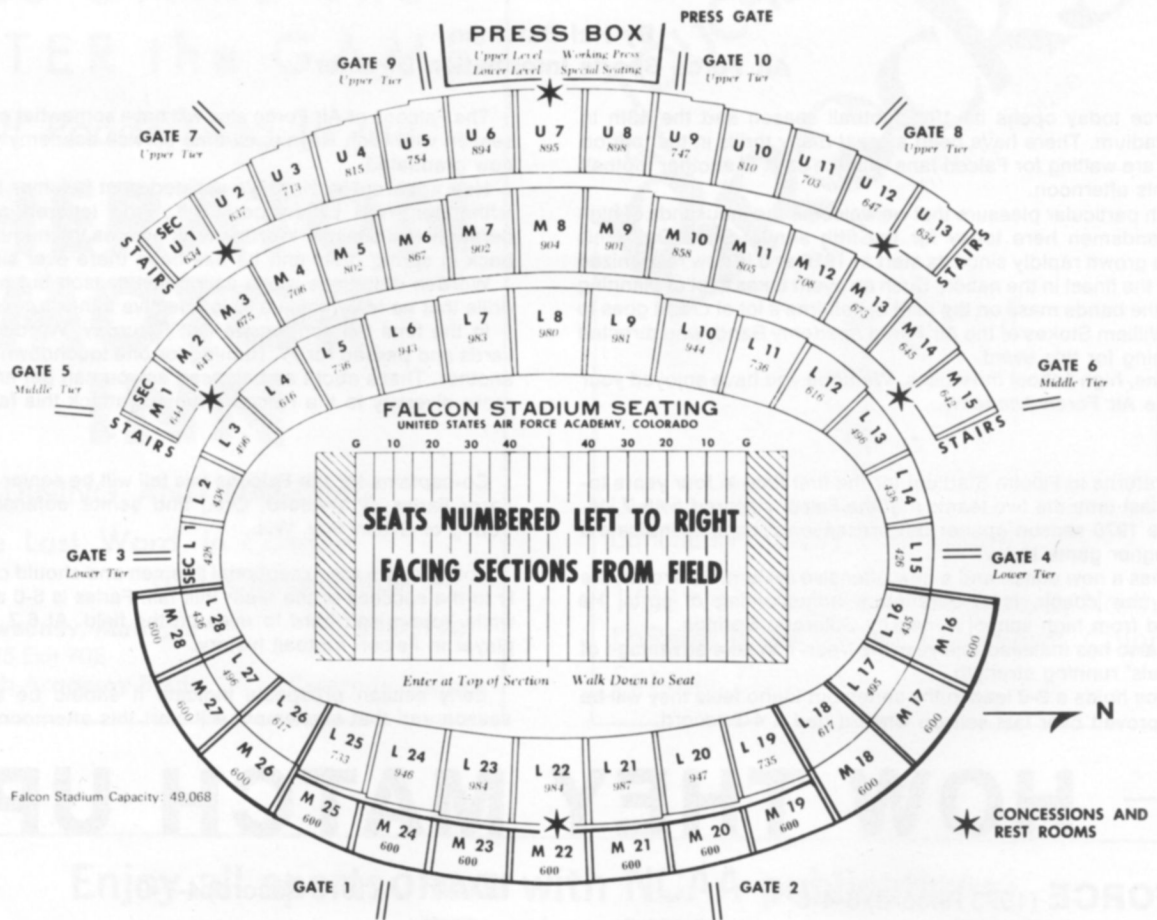

## Stadium Information

### LOST AND FOUND

If you have lost or found an article before or during a game at Falcon Stadium check with the concession stand nearest your seat. If you find or have lost an article after the game check with the main concession stand under the press box on the west side of the stadium.

### FIRST AID

Trained medical personnel are in attendance at all Air Force home games. In case of any emergency, report immediately to the head usher in your seating area. There are two first aid rooms and two first aid stations located in Falcon Stadium. These rooms are located in the east side building and on the third tier of the west side, directly under the press box. The stations are located off the walkways of the first and second tiers in the vicinity of the 50-yard line.

### EMERGENCY CALLS

Individuals expecting emergency calls should file their seat section, row and seat number with the command post, which is located in the west side of the stadium in the press box. Their office number is 472-4538. A call number will then be used. **No special announcements are made over the public address system except in cases of gravest emergency. Please do not request this service needlessly.**

## STADIUM FACTS

For natural beauty, Falcon Stadium is hard to surpass. Built into the base of the Rampart Range mountains, the modern facility also is one of the most functional sports structures in the country.

The concrete structure, built in a natural bowl, has 49,068 permanent seats and can hold up to 50,000 spectators with additional temporary bleachers. There is one level of seats on the east side and three tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession stands and restroom areas. All seats are within easy walking distance of the 9,610-vehicle capacity parking lot which surrounds the stadium on three sides.

The stadium is easily accessible from divided U. S. Interstate 25 and the Academy's Stadium Boulevard which leads directly to the parking lot. (The stadium is approximately six miles from the South Gate entrance and about four miles from the North Gate entrance to the Academy.) There is also ample parking space for 300 commercial busses, plus a rail siding located just a few hundred yards from the bowl for special trains.

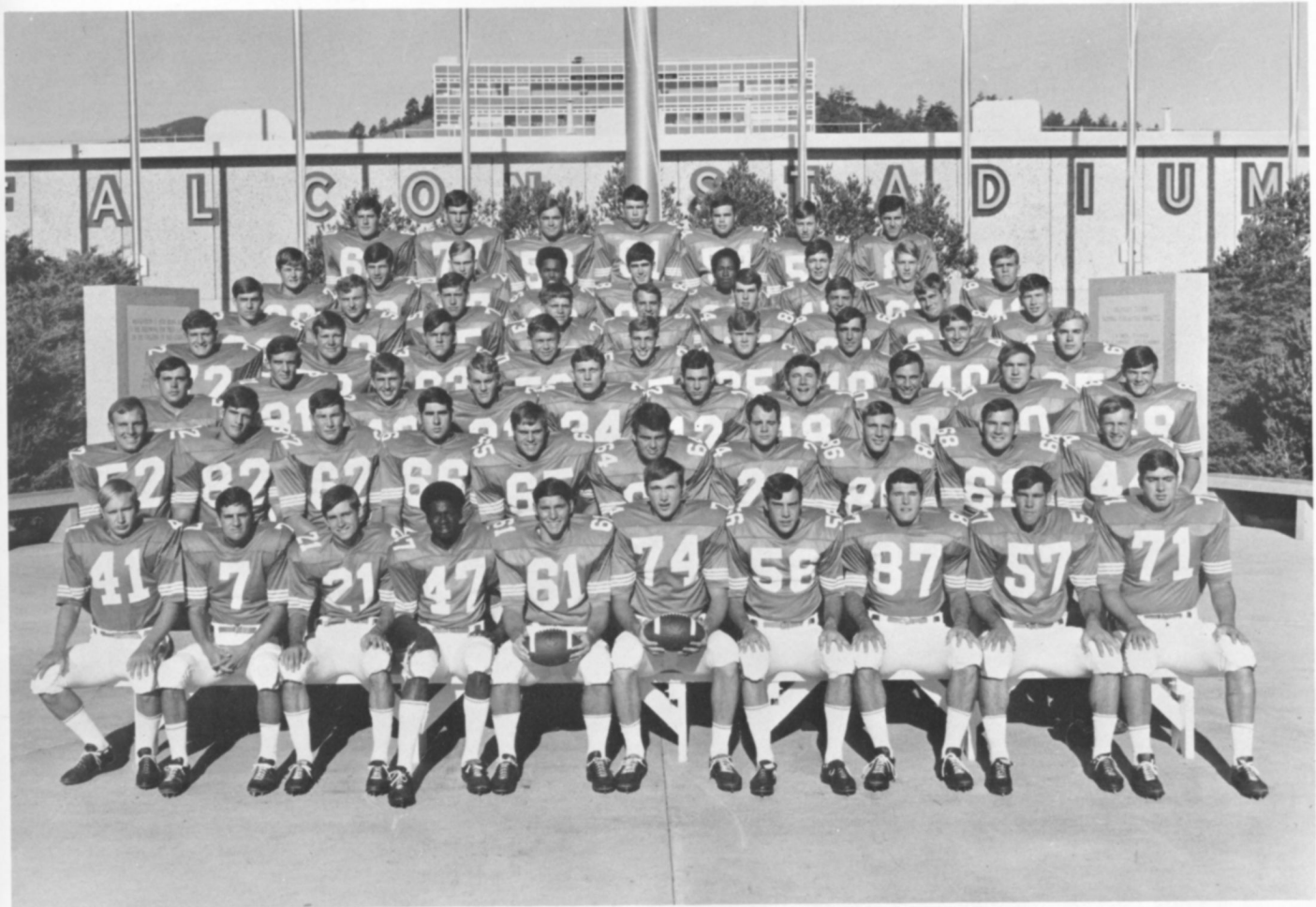

# University of Idaho

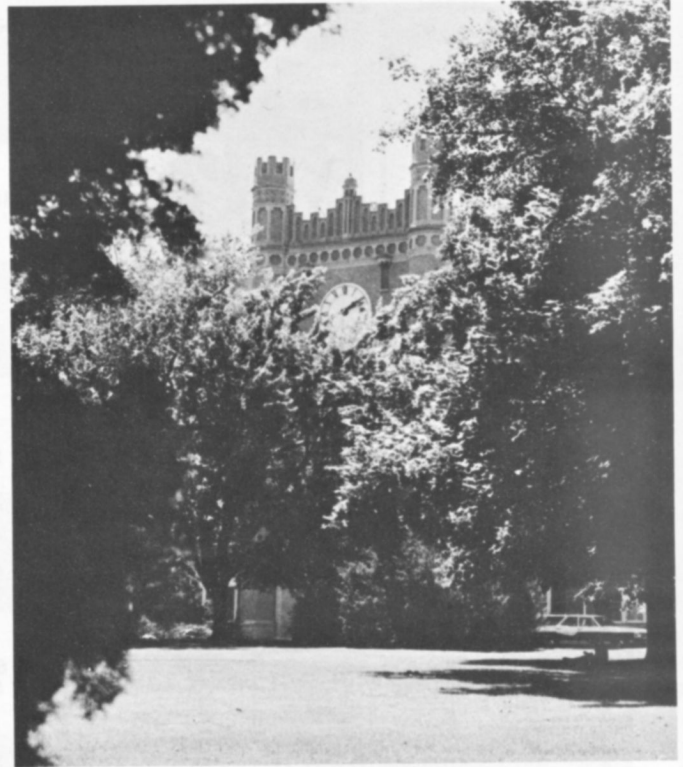
Located in Moscow, Idaho, the University of Idaho is surrounded by rolling hills and beautiful mountains. Upon visiting the campus, the casual visitor gets the impression of being close to nature as well as being in the midst of a bustling modern urban environment.

The University of Idaho was established in 1889 by the Idaho Territorial Legislature. The establishment of the University in such a manner makes it unique in the nation. As The State of Idaho came into being, so did the University of Idaho by the actions of this legislature. The growth of the University has been steady from those early days as the 1890s when it had only six students to 1974 when it has over 7,300 registered undergraduate students. The number of students on the campus is only partly indicative of what the University has to offer. There are eight colleges making up the academic environment, including: Letters and Science, Agriculture, Law, Mines, Engineering, Forestry, Education, Business and Economics, and the Graduate School.

For the student coming to the University of Idaho there is an opportunity to meet people from most of the other states in the United States, as well as people from nearly 30 foreign countries. This vast mixture of students gives the campus a truly cosmopolitan atmosphere.

The areas of involvement and participation for students on the campus are almost as numerous as the number of students on the campus. Students can participate in any of the major inter-collegiate athletic programs, the intramural athletic programs, student government and any number of service and academic honoraries. In addition to these there is the opportunity for the student to become involved in his campus living group. Living accommodations at the University of Idaho include any one of 15 University dormitories, 18 national fraternities, or nine national sororities. In addition to these, for upper-division students, there are a number of single occupancy apartments on campus.

Of special pride to the University is the married student housing located on the periphery of the campus. Occupancy started in the fall of 1970. Additional units are being constructed today. The complex is completely landscaped, making it one of the most attractive married student areas in the country.



**ADMINISTRATION BUILDING**

Academically, all the colleges co-ordinate their programs sufficiently to assure the emergence of well qualified professional competence in any of 130 areas. Idaho's Graduate School offers master's degrees in 63 majors listed by undergraduate colleges, as well as doctorate programs in 20 areas within six of the colleges.

The main part of the campus is growing almost as fast as the ever increasing numbers of new students. Yes, Idaho's enrollment is still on the rise, going against the current national trend. Within the past two years, facilities finished to meet the need of this increased enrollment include: College of Law building, Performing Arts Center, the 11 story "Theophulus Tower" dormitory, the College of Education building, the Women's Physical Education structure, an ultra-modern swimming complex, an 18-hole golf course, a new nine-lane track facility, the new College of Forestry building and phase one of New Idaho Stadium.

The second and most important phase of construction at New Idaho Stadium will be completed in time for the 1975 football season if current plans go ahead as scheduled. The facility will be domed, giving the University a truly modern multi-purpose complex. All athletic events will be held in this facility with the exception of baseball and golf. They will be able to conduct practices inside during inclement weather.

One school official summed up the University's effectiveness as "coming closer to producing what we promise" than most other institutions of higher learning. One final part of that promise includes the goals, objectives, careers, and alternatives that go along with higher education. The University's inspirational horizons exceed the broadest visual panoramas the State of Idaho has to offer.

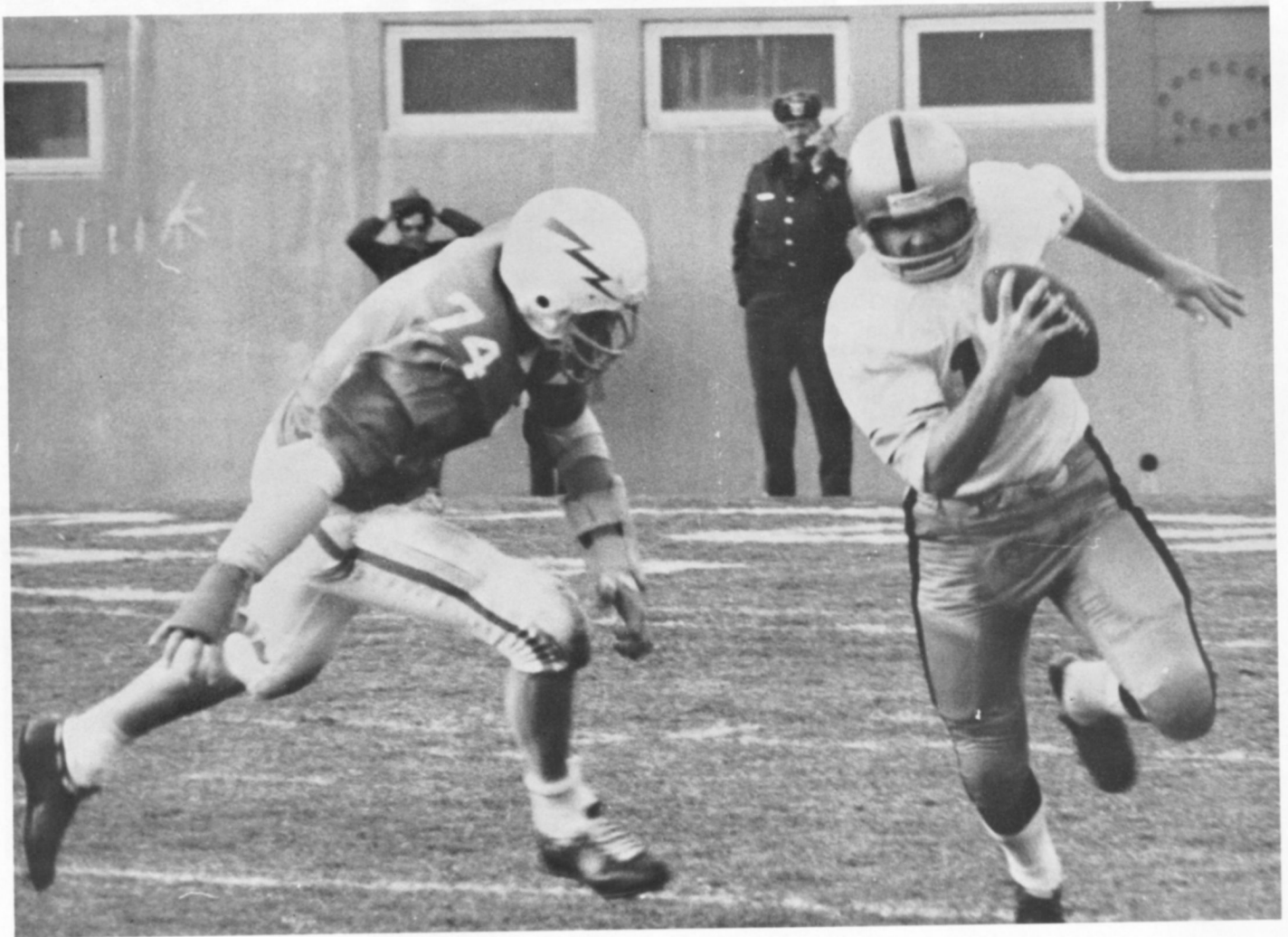
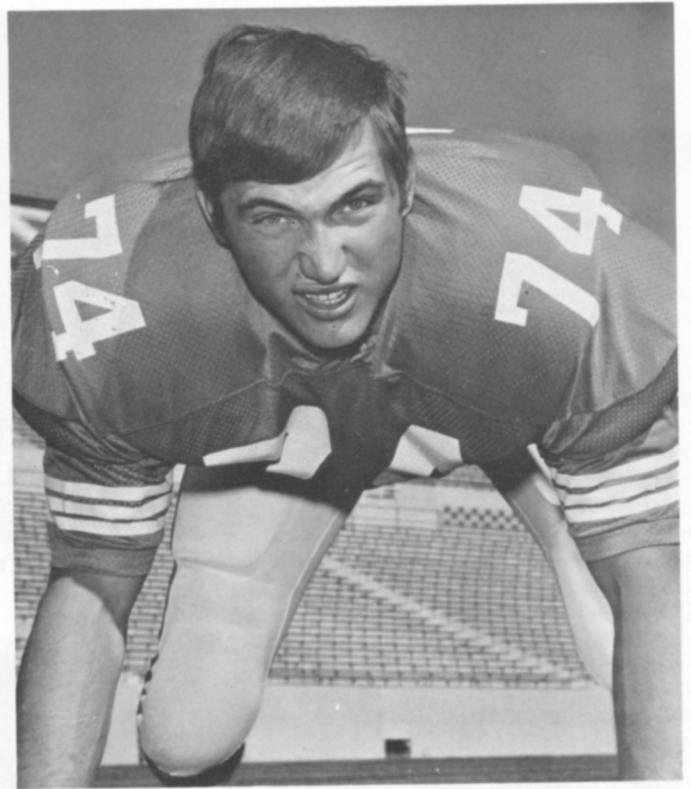


## FALCON SPOTLIGHT:

# TERRY YOUNG

**Green Bay, Wisconsin**

Green Bay, Wisconsin, is a town of legendary proportions in football. It could be just natural, then, that one of the stars of the 1974 Air Force football team should come from that northern Wisconsin town. The 1973 playing accomplishments of Terry Young certainly live up to that reputation. Young, the 1974 defensive captain and an All-America candidate, compiled the highest number of tackles for losses during the 1973 season. He corralled the opposition in the backfield 15 times for a net loss of 65 yards. He also accounted for 90 tackles, which was the third best on last year's team. A native of Green Bay, Young has already earned one varsity letter, playing 266 minutes last season, recovering two fumbles and causing another. The tallest player in the history of Academy football, the six foot seven inch player, poses a menacing figure to a quarterback trying to pick out a receiver downfield. A senior this season, Young is a geography major and serves as co-captain of the 1974 Falcons along with offensive captain and senior Larry Fariss. Before coming to the Academy, Young earned all-state honors at Premontre High School from where he graduated in 1971. He earned this high athletic honor in both football and basketball.

A two-year letterman at tailback, Mike was shifted to safety on defense in the spring and will be one of the Falcons' top players in that position this fall. He was the team's third-leading rusher in both 1972 and 1973 and was also the top punt returner both seasons. His average of 16.7 yards per return is one of the best marks in Academy history. He is a good student with a B average in a history major.



**CORRIE KUNDERT**, 5-11, 212-pound senior linebacker from Sacramento, Calif.

Corrie is a two-year letterman who adds valuable depth to a key position this fall. As a reserve last season, he made 32 tackles and broke up three passes. **AL BREADY**, 6-1, 186-pound senior flanker from Cincinnati.

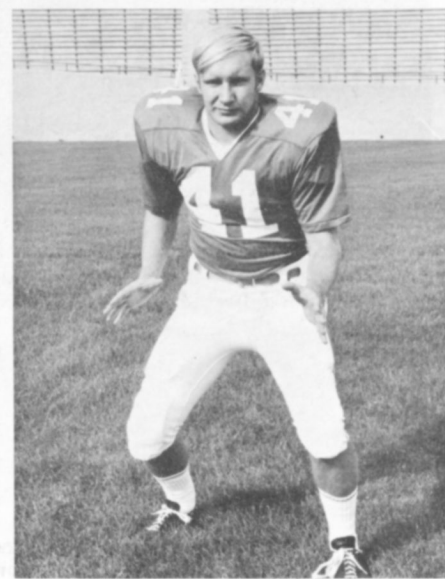

**ROD HENNEK**, 5-11, 184-pound senior cornerback from Lexington, Neb.

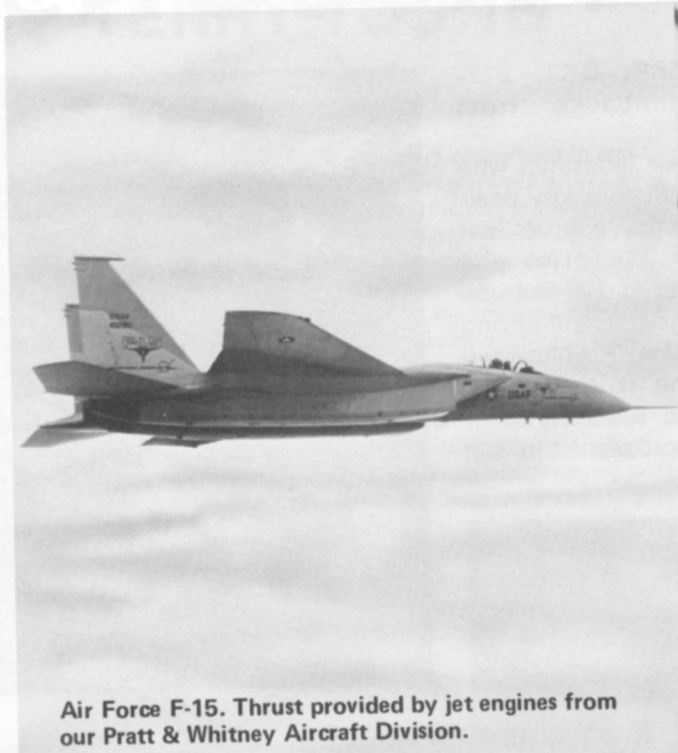

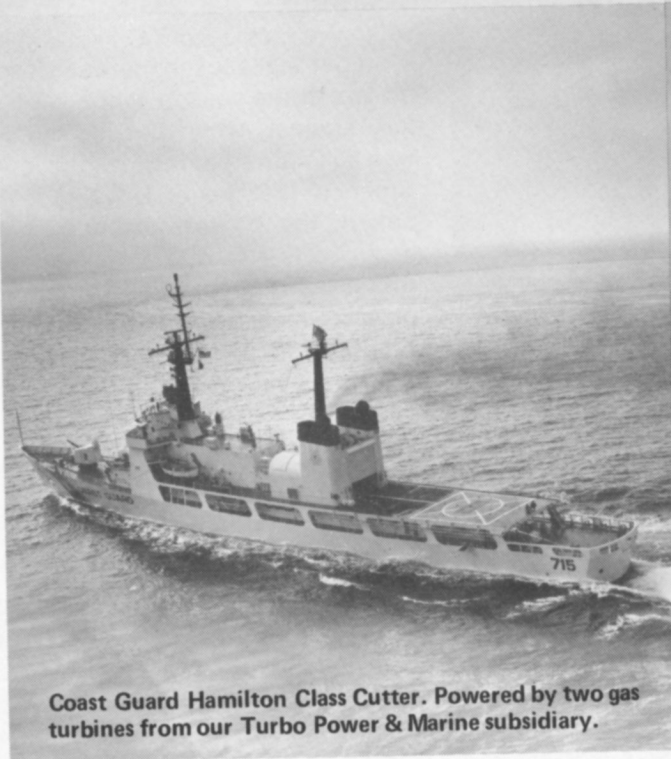

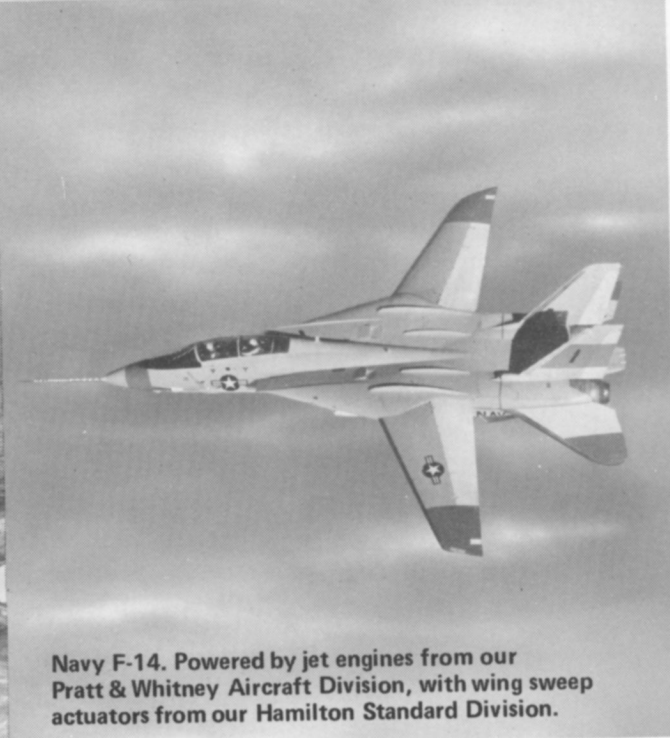

# Lindsey Nelson Plugs College Football

I've been a college football fan all my life.

I like the fact that the product is an original, and it's stamped "Made in America." It started, like our country did, in the East, spread westward, then all over the U.S.A.

First radio and then television enlarged the popularity of college football; and, as a broadcaster, it's been my good fortune to witness a lot of it.

I got to know the Galloping Ghost of the Illini, the Four Horsemen of Notre Dame, Little Boy Blue, and Mr. Inside and Mr. Outside.

I have done games witnessed by Harry Truman, Lyndon Johnson, and Jack Kennedy. In fact, I once re-created a football broadcast on tape for Jack Kennedy before he was President (there were no blank spots in our tapes).

## He's Been There

I've done 11 seasons of NCAA games on network television, and the Notre Dame telecasts for six seasons. I've done 11 Army-Navy games, 14 Cotton Bowls, five Sugar Bowls and four Rose Bowls.

Red Grange, the Galloping Ghost of the Illini, and I once did a game at his Alma Mater. As we toured the campus, Red pointed to a great open space and said, "That's where I took

ROTC instruction. At least I was along for the ride. I was in the cavalry and I had an old horse that wasn't very fast but knew more military than MacArthur."

**I once spoke to the New Haven Gridiron Club, and afterwards, someone wanted to know if I'd like to visit the legendary Mory's, "the dear old Temple bar we loved so well." I went with Albie Booth, Yale's "Little Boy Blue."**

For me, it's all been one delightful experience, starting when I listened to broadcasts in my home town of Columbia, Tennessee. Later, at the University of Tennessee I was signed on by Coach Bob Neyland as a tutor for scholarship athletes who were deficient in freshman English. That put me in close touch with Neyland over a long stretch. He was probably the greatest defensive coach the game ever knew. It also put me in touch with a lot of great football players, many of whom later became great coaches all across the land.

## Tipped Off

Coaches have usually been cooperative in revealing unusual tactics they anticipated using. Navy Coach Eddie Erdelatz tipped me off to a Joe Bellino running pass he'd open the game with. (It didn't work.) Bear Bryant told me about a flea-flicker

he'd use. (It was completed.) Miami's Andy Gustafson told me how to recognize his quick-kick formation.

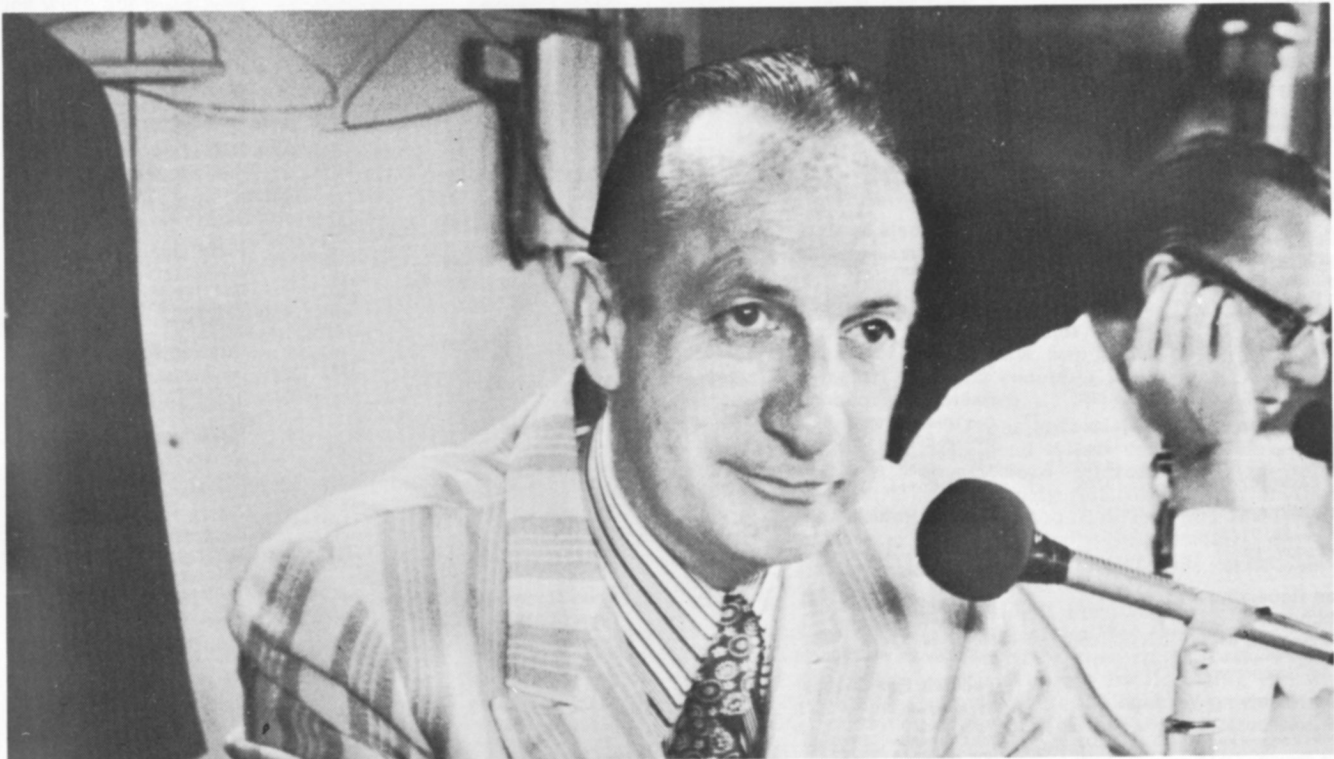
**Bobby Dodd at Georgia Tech told me about an unbalanced line he'd use against Kentucky to try to spring George Volkert for a long gain. (It worked, and, incidentally, the Kentucky Coach was Blanton Collier assisted by Don Shula.)**

Darrell Royal told me about an unbalanced line he'd use against Ole Miss in the Sugar Bowl. (It didn't work.) Red Blaik didn't tell me that just before kickoff he'd switch his Army team to new grey and gold jerseys. You couldn't read a number with a telescope.

Terry Brennan didn't tell me he'd open against Oklahoma with a single wing formation. He may not have told Tailback Paul Hornung either, judging from the speed with which Oklahoma linebacker Jerry Tubbs got Hornung on his shoulder.

It might sound as though I've been doing college football for a long time. But it doesn't *seem* long. I continue to find in college football the excitement and purpose that are, to me, consistent with the need of ambitious and restless youth to have excitement and purpose.

I've been a college football fan all my life.

# Underdog Role Leaves President Undaunted

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** President Gerald R. Ford, a center-linebacker on the 1932-33-34 football teams at the University of Michigan, often has drawn parallels between politics and athletics. As a freshman congressman, House Minority Leader and now President, he has maintained, "Thanks to my football experience, I know the value of team play. It is, I believe, one of the most important lessons to be learned and practiced in our lives."

Gerald Ford knew he faced a challenge. The scouting reports by the Michigan coaches left little doubt that Minnesota would be the finest team the Wolverines would meet all season. And the Gophers were a running team, a fact that particularly concerned him.

Six-foot-two and a deceptive 198 pounds, Ford was Michigan's linebacker and center. His prime assignment that Saturday against Minnesota would be to help contain the running of all-America Pug Lund and Stan Kostka, a sophomore sensation at fullback.

Ford had played on Michigan's two national championship teams of 1932 and 1933, but now in his senior year the Wolverines were struggling with just one victory in four games. The Gophers, headed directly for the Big Ten title, were four to five touchdown favorites.

The unbeaten Gophers had not defeated the Wolverines in Minneapolis in 41 years, and the Twin Cities were alive with a week-long battle cry of "Mangle Michigan." A record 60,000 fans turned out to watch their Gophers end that long era of frustration.

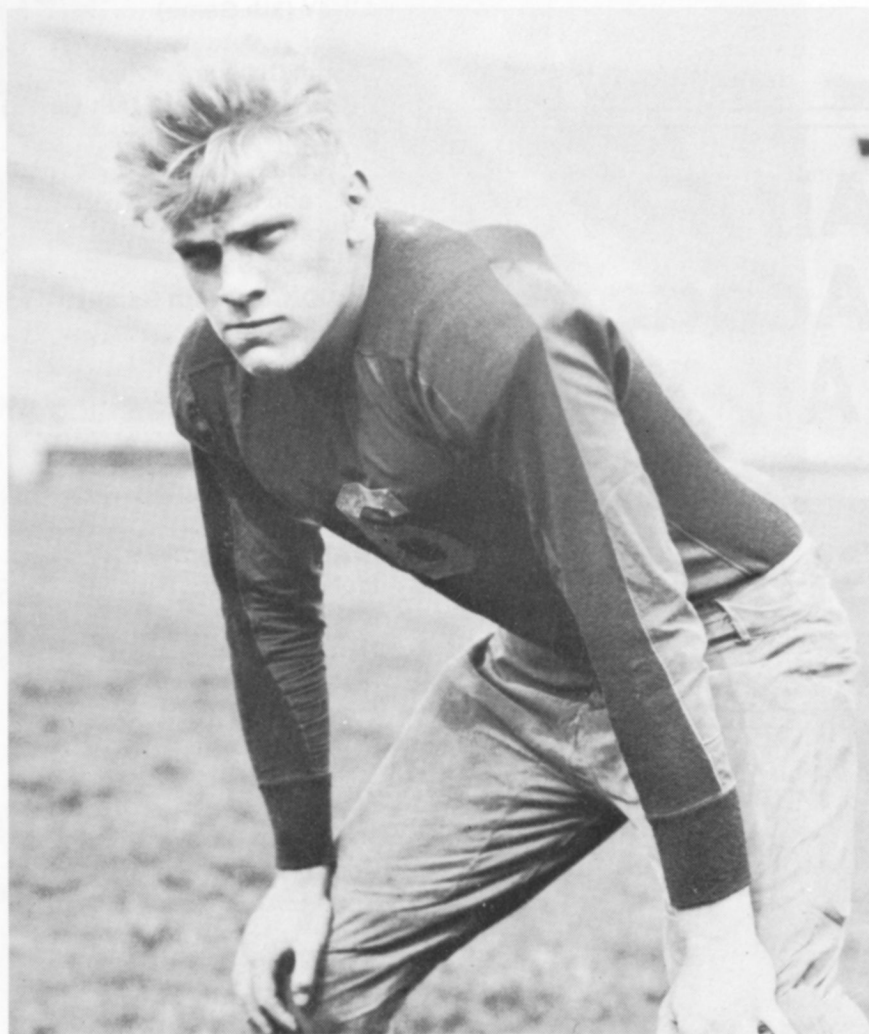
## Michigan's Blitz

Michigan's defense, however, with Ford and his linebacking mate Cefric Sweet playing inspired football, continually stopped the Minnesota attack by using the new technique of blitzing. Surprisingly, the half ended in a scoreless tie.

"I knew how good they were," recalled Bennie Oosterbaan, Michigan's assistant coach who had scouted the Gophers. "They were heavy favorites and when I walked into the dressing room at halftime, I had tears in my eyes I was so proud of them. Ford and Sweet played their hearts out. They were everywhere on defense."

Minnesota eventually won that game, 34-0, and went on to the national championship, but that cold November afternoon in Memorial Stadium has remained very special for Ford.

**"During 25 years in the rough-and-tumble world of politics, I often thought of the experiences before, during and after that game in 1934," Ford says. "Remembering them has helped me many times to face a tough situation, take action and make every effort possible despite adverse odds.**

"I remember how Michigan students and people in Ann Arbor met us at the train station that Sunday. There was a rousing parade and this was a meaningful tribute to the fight the Wolverines had put up against Minnesota."

His teammates also paid Ford a meaningful tribute that season. Michigan won just one game, but Ford was voted the Wolverines most valuable player. As Francis Wistert, an all-America who played with Ford on two championship teams, later was to observe, "They felt Jerry was one guy who would stay and fight in a losing cause."

## Rich Blood

Michigan coach Harry Kipke recruited Ford with the promise of a job. He waited on tables and cleaned up dishes at the University Hospital, washed dishes at his fraternity house and later became manager of the DEKE House. "I also was able to sell blood at \$25 a bottle twice a month and that money came in mighty

handy," said Ford of those depression years.

Ford played in the East-West Shrine and College All-Star games and received offers from two professional football teams. The young economics major, however, decided to study law, and Kipke helped him obtain a coaching job on the Yale football staff.

"I was an assistant line coach and also head coach of the junior varsity," Ford offered. "And we had some pretty fine young men on that JV team, too. Bob Taft and Bill Proxmire, both now U.S. Senators, played on my JV team and later on the Yale varsity."

President Ford received a law degree at Yale in 1941, served four years in the Navy, then in 1948 started his political career by upsetting the incumbent Republican representative in Michigan's Fifth Congressional District. Again, he had faced long odds against success, but as his teammates knew years before, Jerry Ford was never intimidated by a challenge.

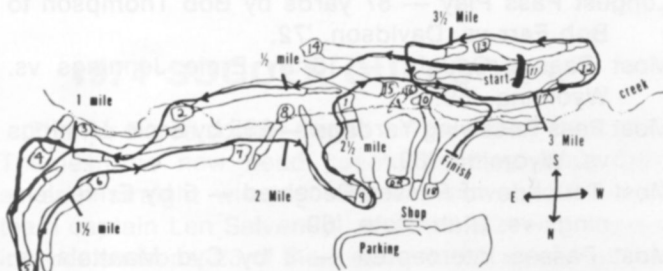

## 1974 SOCCER OUTLOOK

The Air Force soccer squad will be led by Capt. Jim Thames, the new head coach, as they seek their seventh straight winning season. With the return of team captain Len Salvemini, who has scored 53 goals in three seasons, 23 of them last year for a new season record, the Falcons should have a potent offense.

Last year, the Falcons posted an 8-2-2 record enroute to their second straight Rocky Mountain Intercollegiate Soccer League title. Scoring 47 goals in 12 games, Air Force defense allowed only 13 total goals and only five in league competition.

Eight lettermen are returning, led by Salvemini, who was recently selected as a member of the 1975 Pan American team and the 1976 Olympic team. He was also selected as a collegiate All-American in 1972. For three years he has been an all-Far West and all-league selection. Aiding him on offense will be Paul Narzinski (all-league) and Al Patriquin strongly supported by Steve Jonak, Bob Soucy and Tony Villalobos as well as talented freshmen just waiting for a chance to step in.

Defensively, the Falcons will be anchored by three seniors — Jack Shine (All-Far West), John Tamkun and Rich Hill along with sophomore Bob Bartolone, a returning letterman, and JV standouts Rex Armstrong, Sean Kelly and Dwight Landmann. Sophomore Sean Keohane and freshman Greg Schultz will be fighting it out for the starting goalie position.

Highlights of last year included victories over Michigan State and MacMurry College along with a 1-1 tie against Navy at Navy. This year, Air Force faces tough opposition from nationally-ranked Southern Illinois as well as Benedictine College, British Columbia and Wisconsin-Green Bay, Army and a stronger local league. Potentially this could be one of the strongest Falcon teams ever.

# AIR FORCE WATER POLO

Last year the Falcons posted a record of 16-6, the best in school history. However, this year's team could be even stronger.

Led by All-America candidate Ben Phillips, who is also this season's team captain, the Falcons are a well-balanced team. Phillips, a senior, is the holder of numerous school records and was the leading scorer and total points leader each of the past three years. A native of Honolulu, Haw., Phillips has also been the leading game scorer in more than three-quarters of the games played since 1971.

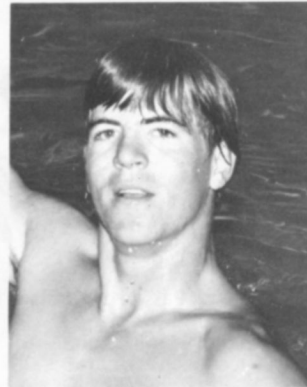
Besides his offensive skills, Phillips is also a team player, leading the team in assists as a freshman and placing second each of the last two seasons.

Head Coach Reggie Pasieczny has said of the Falcon ace, "If we can get the right people to see Ben play, there is no doubt in my mind that he will be chosen an All-American".

Also helping to create the balance on this year's team are the skillful talents of junior Bill Monroe, the team's third leading scorer last season with 49 points, and Don Gresham, a junior who tallied 47 points in 1973.

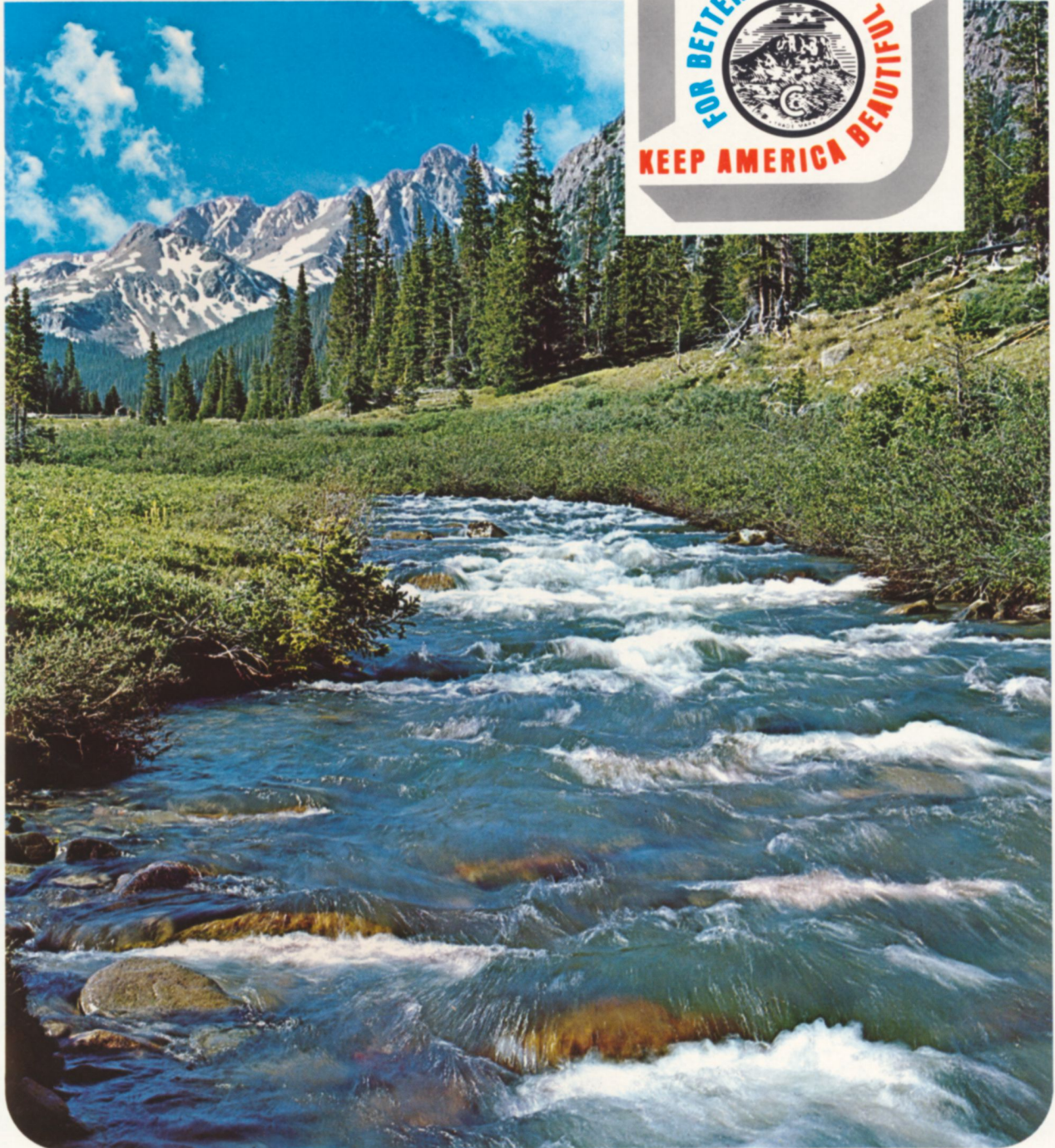

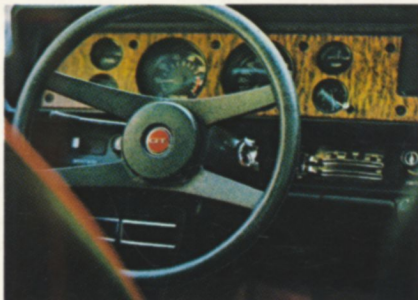
