

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MICKI KING - OLYMPIAN

Early last May, 1972 Olympic gold medalist Capt. Micki King had the distinction of being the first woman to instruct a physical education class at the Academy.

Currently serving in the Athletic Department as assistant business manager, she has been devoting a couple of mornings each week since May to teaching a senior elective class in diving.

Teaching diving is not new to the Munich threemeter diving champion. However, that first class last May was her first experience with an adult, all-male class and it seems to have been a rewarding experience for her as well as the cadets.

"I think all the guys in that first class were a bit curious when they learned I was instructing the class," she said. "But I don't think any of them doubted my abilities or credentials."

"I haven't felt any awkwardness in dealing with the cadets in the class. I've always had to train with men so I don't think there has been anything all that unusual for me. I've felt quite comfortable with the class.

"Some of the students had never done any diving and I've been pleased with the progress each group has made."

Captain King said she has been particularly impressed by the attitude of her students.

"They have done everything I asked and they have been truly interested in learning. I believe they trust what I tell them is right."

How did she think cadets would react to having a female instructor, especially when the woman had achieved fame in her field?

"I had an idea most of the cadets were looking forward to the class," she said. However, the cadets who signed up for the class in the Spring '73 semester didn't know Captain King was teaching the class.

"Had I known sooner, I think it would have been a drawing factor rather than a deterrent," says 2nd Lt. Breck Cunningham, a 1973 graduate and former captain of the Falcon gymnastics team. "I've followed her diving activities for a long time and it was a pleasant surprise to find her instructing the class."

Another '73 graduate and former gymnast, 2nd Lt. Bill Ritter, had a slight advantage in that he had already met Captain King and had previously done some diving under her guidance.

"When I signed up for the course I was really looking forward to the extra coaching from her," he said.

2nd Lt. Mark Prill, a two-year football letterman and 1973 graduate, walked into that first class not knowing who would be teaching. His saying he was "pleasantly surprised" is probably a bit of an understatement.

What about her ability as an instructor?

"The fact she is a woman has a positive effect," says Cunningham.

"It made me try harder to do what she has asked. She understands differences in ability and does what she can to vary training for different skill levels."

Prill says, "I think knowing who is teaching makes us work a little harder and I think everybody has been responding well to her."

"She is patient, but demanding and she knows how to teach diving," says Ritter. "I have the utmost confidence in her ability."

What about her achievements as a diver, especially her gold medal in the 1972 Olympics? "I find her to be a nice, down-to-earth person," says Cunningham. "She is not one to flaunt her medal and her ability."

After the initial surprise, Prill said he discovered she was "very personable."

"I was soon at ease. Her achievements don't get in the way of what she's doing."

A member of her class this semester is senior Don McMonagle, a pole valuter on the Falcon track team.

"The fact that she is an Olympic gold medalist and an expert in her field, gives her a lot of credibility," says McMonagle. "You have to have a lot of faith in her judgment. She's a great teacher and always keeps the class interesting."

Another class member this fall, senior Tom Green, echoed McMonagle's views.

"I really looked forward to going to the class," says Green. "That first day of class I couldn't even jump off the board properly, but Captain King was very patient and now I feel like I've really improved. She has a way of building up your confidence and making you execute dives you didn't think you could do."

About herself Captain King says, "I think of myself as being pretty ordinary."


Well, maybe. The cadets she has taught so far say she is normal, friendly and more than a capable teacher.



Players on the Falcon roster from Oregon include starting junior offensive guard Larry Fariss of Medford and sophomore offensive guard John Hazen of Lake



LOST AND FOUND

If you lose an article while attending a game at Falcon Stadium, check at the main ticket office in the east building or the main concessions office on the top tier of the west side. FIRST AID

Trained medical personnel are in attendance at all Air Force home games. In case of any emergency, report it immediately to the head usher in your portal. There are two first aid rooms and two first aid stations located in Falcon Stadium. The rooms are located in the east side building and on the third tier of the west side, directly under the press box. The stations are located off the walkways of the first and second tiers in the vicinity of the 50-yard line.

EMERGENCY CALLS

Individuals expecting emergency calls should file their portal section, row and seat number with the command post, located in the east side building. Office number is 472-1151. A call number will then be issued. No special announcements are made over the public address system except in cases of gravest emergency. Please do not request this service needlessly.

STADIUM FACTS

For natural beauty, Falcon Stadium is hard to surpass. Built into the base of the Rampart Range mountains, the modern facility also is one of the most functional sports structures in the country.

The concrete structure, built in a natural bowl, has 49,068 permanent seats and can hold up to 50,000 spectators with additional temporary bleachers. There is one level of seats on the east side and three tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession stands and restroom areas. All seats are within easy walking distance of the 9,610-vehicle capacity parking lot which surrounds the stadium on three sides.

The stadium is easily accessible from divided U. S. Interstate 25 and the Academy's Stadium Boulevard which leads directly to the parking lot. There is also ample parking space for 300 commercial busses, and a rail siding is located just a few hundred yards from the bowl for special trains.

RICH HAYNIE


6-2, 193-pound senior quarterback from Florissant, Mo.







"Universities dwell at the growing edge of knowledge," says the report of the Committee for the Future of the University of Oregon.

The University of Oregon is growing in both new and traditional areas of knowledge. It is a national center for study and research in a number of diverse fields. Its students have a choice of more than 5,000 courses offered through the College of Liberal Arts and nine professional schools and colleges.

Recent growth includes the establishment of the first new schools since 1920—the School of the Librarianship, the only one accredited in the State, and the Wallace School of Community Service and Public Affairs, which already has a national reputation for its innovative curriculum. New centers have been established for volcanology, gerontology, leisure study and community service, and environmental studies. The University has begun a clinical services program in mental retardation, expanded its law center, added a new bio-social research facility, and created a statistical laboratory and computer center.

An institution which opened in 1876 with 177 students, five faculty members and one building, the University of Oregon is now the eighth largest community in Oregon with more than 15,000 students, 1,200 faculty, and several dozen buildings. Its campus includes the Institute of Marine Biology at Charleston, Oregon and Pine Mountain Observatory near Bend, Oregon. Last spring for the first time in the history of the University, a regular term of classes was conducted away from the main campus, at the Charleston institute, where summer sessions regulary attract 100 students each year.

Major discoveries and developments in both the social and physical sciences have become commonplace at the University of Oregon where students' participation in research gives them on-the-job training in the process by which knowledge is acquired. At the same time, the University maintains a strong tradition in the arts and humanities.

As it nears its 100th birthday, the University of Oregon is a place where original inquiry is the heart of the educational process.







With the top five scorers returning, including All-American candidate Ben Phillips among the 12 lettermen, prospects for 1973 appear excellent.

Besides Phillips, the Falcons have a solid corps of three experienced seniors in team captain Kelly Kemp, Rick Pilling and Jim Struble.

Pilling, the top defensive player on the squad the past two seasons, showed impressive scoring punch in 1972 with 53 points, second only to Phillips.

Kemp was the third-leading point producer with 47 and led the Falcons in assists with 28. Struble finished just behind Kemp with 44 points.

Junior Phillips, of course, is the key to a successful season. The overwhelming top scorer his first two years, he must score consistently for the Falcons to be a threat.

Air Force vs. New Mexico, Sept. 29



STEVE BRADSHAW, Defensive End (51)

Steve Bradshaw, New Mexico's candidate for All-Everything at defensive end, took aside a member of the press at UNM's Photo Day back in August.

"I just thought you'd like to know," he said in toothy grin, "we're going to win the WAC this year."

Bradshaw then quietly walked off smiling to pose for his umpteenth picture diving on top of a football or grimacing menacingly at a photographer's little black box camera.

Bradshaw has arisen to celebrity status in this his senior season. Coaches at New Mexico have always been aware of the tremendous effort that the Farmington, N.M., native puts into football and the intense manner in which he plays. But only late last season did the fact seem to catch up among Lobo fans. It now is big sport at New Mexico to watch the "Bad Dude" at work at defensive end.

"The guy is everywhere," one opposing coach lamented last fall. "He seems to know where you're going with the ball. And if he isn't knocking the whey out of a ballcarrier he's sure taking somebody out of the play."

Lobo head Coach Rudy Feldman is Bradshaw's biggest fan.

"Steve may be, pound-for-pound, the best defensive end in the nation," Feldman said earlier this summer. "He has excellent mobility and the desire to play his very best. You can say he may be the best defensive player I've had here."

Defensive line coach Del Wight says more.

"Steve Bradshaw is the fightin'est, doggin'est, toughest football player we've got," he says. "He can be knocked completely out of a play, but he'll get up and go after the ballcarrier anyway. He wants in on the action."

Bradshaw has put on ten pounds over his playing weight from last year — he's up to 205 pounds now. But at that weight he can hold his own with any offensive lineman in the Western Athletic Conference.

"I feel that if I fire out fast I can beat any guy, no matter how big he is," Bradshaw has said. "It's a matter of being quick off the line. I have to take advantage of my quickness. I may not be able to beat the other lineman, but if I can at least hold my own, I've done my job. There is no way the runner can come where I am."

Bradshaw more than holds his own. He was New Mexico's leading tackler last season with 104 tackles, seven fumble recoveries, ten deflected passes and seven sackings of the quarterback for a loss.

"This can be a really good year for us," Bradshaw explains. "The younger players are pushing the older guys and we have better team enthusiasm than at any time since I've been here.

"I really think we'll win the WAC."


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
