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DRUM AND BUGLE CORPS PUTS IN A HARD DAY'S

"All in a day's work," you say.

So what is your day's work? Eight hours, 9 to 5? Shift work, odd hours, weekends? Nine hours? Ten? Twelve?

How 'bout a "day's work" put in between Friday afternoon and Sunday afternoon — after a full week, which sometimes includes 15-hour days!

That is the not-all-too-uncommon "day's work" for members of the Air Force Drum and Bugle Corps, the only such corps in the U. S. Air Force.

The Drum and Bugle Corps, like the other components of the Air Force Academy Band, frequently works just such a "day" — and then some.

Take a recent trip to Cincinnati, for example. The Drum and Bugle Corps was invited to be the guests of the Cincinnati Bengals professional football team for the weekend. Invitations such as this are occasionally accepted as

part of the Academy's community relations program, although the primary mission of the Academy Band and its components is to support the Cadet Wing by playing for meal formations, parades, football games and others.

As part of the invitation to Cincinnati, the Corps was asked to present pre-game and half-time shows during the Bengal's exhibition game with the Philadelphia Eagles in Riverfront Stadium — the second consecutive year for such an invitation.

The trip began dubiously with word that the airplane had trouble — a two and a half hour delay.

The flight to Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton was uneventful except for my first lesson in chess — over half the members of the Drum and Bugle Corps engage in this mind-boggling encounter.

After transferring to a famous Air Force "Blue Bird" bus, driven by a member of the Corps, we headed to Cincinnati about 60 miles further into the night. That put us at the hotel well after midnight — fine for the Corps (average age 22 years), but a little late for the old major!

Saturday saw no relief in either the schedule or the weather, which was 85 degrees with 90 per cent humidity! After a late breakfast and a short walk to the beautiful Riverfront Stadium, an informal rehearsal of the pre-game and half-time shows accustomed the Corps to the 55,000-seat home of the Reds and Bengals.

With barely time for a short rest and uniform change, the 41-man Corps was off to a photo session and a mini-concert at the fountain mall in downtown Cincinnati. The applause

from the outdoor group hadn't subsided when Senior Master Sergeant William A. Stokes, non-commissioned officer in charge of the Corps, headed 'em up and moved 'em out for River-front.

With the three-story high scoreboard flashing the story of the U. S. Air Force Academy Drum and Bugle Corps to a "standing room only" crowd which dealt two standing ovations, I could tell immediately that "they love us in Cincinnati!" They also invited the Corps back for a third year!

Master Sergeant Robert J. Long, assistant noncommissioned officer for the Corps (and

erstwhile bus driver), led the Corps through two performances which looked flawless to an old marching band drummer. True professionals, though, they said they "could have done a little better." The crowd didn't think so.

The Cincinnati Bengals, like the Corps, won that hot August evening beside the Ohio River. But most Corpsmen didn't get to see the end of the game — 4:30 a.m. comes mighty early when you have to beat the sun up to make a plane.

As an interesting sidelight, the headlights of the bus went out during the dark drive to Wright-Patterson. Another delay. But the uncomplaining Corpsmen made light of the situation, and we were off a short thirty minutes behind schedule.

As the plane pulled to a stop back in Colorado Springs at noon Sunday, Sergeant Bill Stokes told a tired Corps they could have Sunday afternoon off. Not to rest from this trip, but to prepare to play three meal formations for cadets Monday. Another 15-hour day! But again, no complaints — they're all volunteers.

Another day's work. Another hard day's night.

Today's Game | AIR FORCE vs DAVIDSON

Plenty of music and plenty of football will fill the air at Falcon Stadium today.

The music will be supplied by the approximately 12,000 musicians from 59 high school bands from a four-state area. They are here for the Academy's annual Band Day and we will take this time to wish them a hello. Have a pleasant stay.

The air will be filled with footballs since today's visitor, Davidson, will probably pass, at least if their game last Saturday against William & Mary is any indication.

Although Davidson lost the game 51-35, the Wildcats threw 58 passes and completed 37 for 374 yards. It was the Wildcats' best offensive game of the season and may indicate that better days are ahead for Davidson, which is 1-6 entering today's game.

Two Davidson players rank among the best in the nation this week. Quarterback Dave Harper is third in the nation passing, completing 115 passes in 213 attempts for 1,152 yards and five touchdowns.

His favorite receiver has been flanker Walt Walker, who is second in the nation this week in pass receiving with 41 catches for 487 yards and two touchdowns. Being ranked nationally is nothing new for

Walker, however, since he was fifth nationally in pass receiving last season.

The Wildcats, at 1,050 students the smallest college or university playing major college football, have the unique distinction of playing three military schools in a row, after facing Air Force today, the Wildcats travel to Virginia Military Institute next week, then close out the season on Nov. 17 at The Citadel in South Carolina.

* * * * *

Speaking of service academy games, the Falcons play the Wildcats between games with Navy and Army.

Last week, the Falcons fell to Navy 42-6 at Annapolis to drop to 0-1 in the competition for the Commander-in-Chief's Trophy, emblematic of service academy football supremacy.

The Falcons play Army at Falcon Stadium next week and need a victory over the Cadets from the Hudson to remain in competition for the trophy. If Air Force can beat Army, then Army beat Navy the competition will end in a three-way tie at 1-1.

Army won possession of the trophy in the first year of the round robin in 1972 with a 2-0 mark while Navy was 1-1 and Air Force 0-2.

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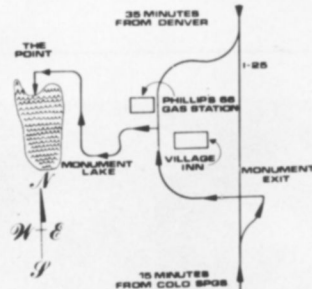

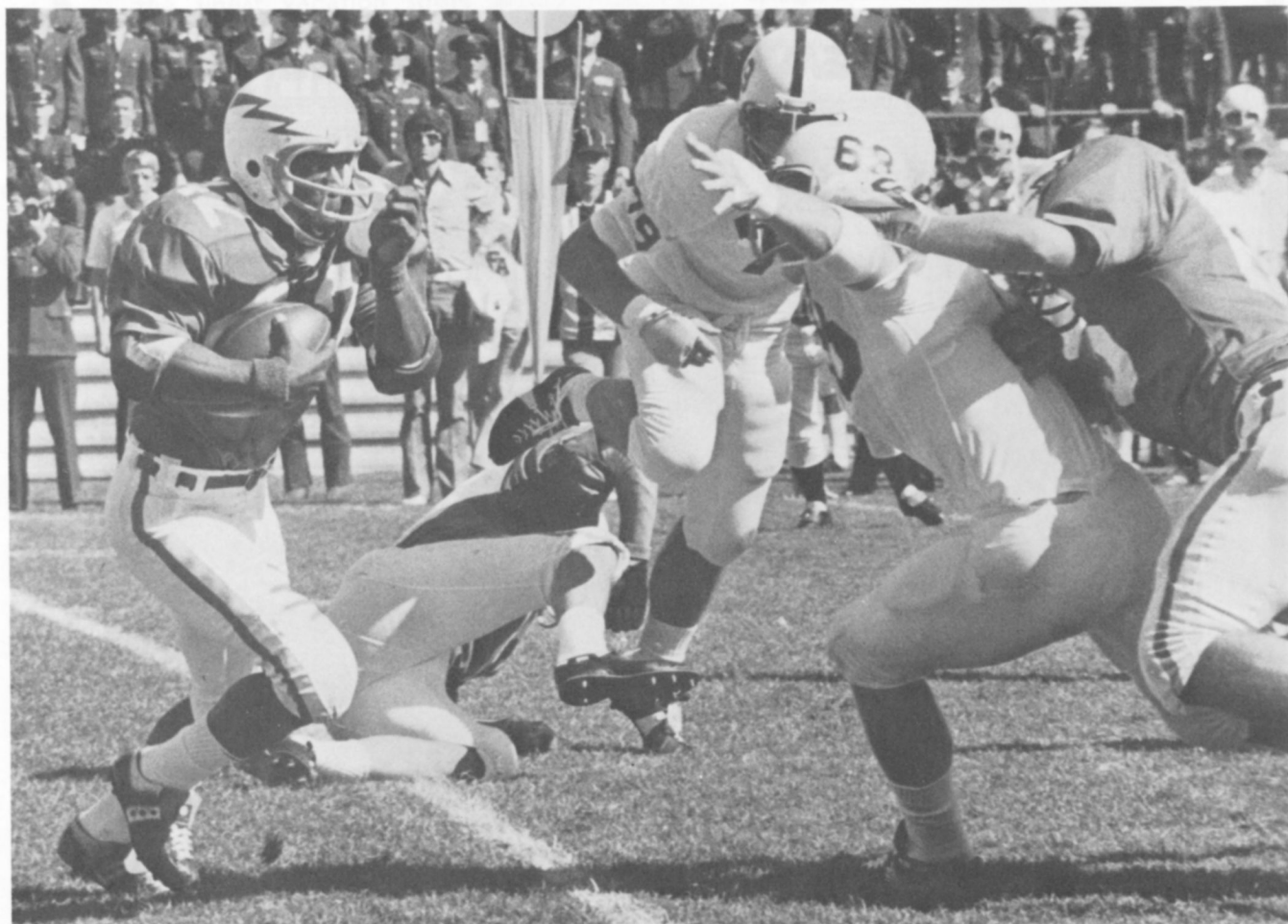


FALCON SPOTLIGHT:

FRANK MURPHY

**5-10, 169-pound senior flanker
from Chicago**

Top pass receiver for the Falcons the past two years, he has also become a top rusher for Air Force in 1973. Had one of the best pass receiving days in Air Force history last year against Arizona State when he caught seven passes for 198 yards and three touchdowns. This season, in addition to his receiving and rushing, he has been averaging over 20 yards per kickoff return. Earned a varsity letter on the Falcon indoor track team last winter as a sprinter. Majors in behavioral sciences.



MEET THE FALCONS



CORRIE KUNDERT, 5-11, 212-pound junior linebacker from Sacramento, Calif. Has seen a lot of action at linebacker this year after lettering as a reserve in 1972 with 26 minutes of play. Last year he was in on 17 tackles, broke up a pass and recovered a fumble. Earned a junior varsity letter with the lacrosse team last spring. His father played football at Utah State.

CHRIS MILODRAGOVICH, 6-1, 200-pound sophomore tailback from Butte, Mont. Leading rusher for the Falcons this year, he has been averaging close to four yards a carry and moved into a starting role against Penn State. On the freshman team last year he was the leading pass receiver with 14 catches and was one of the top rushers with 282 yards.

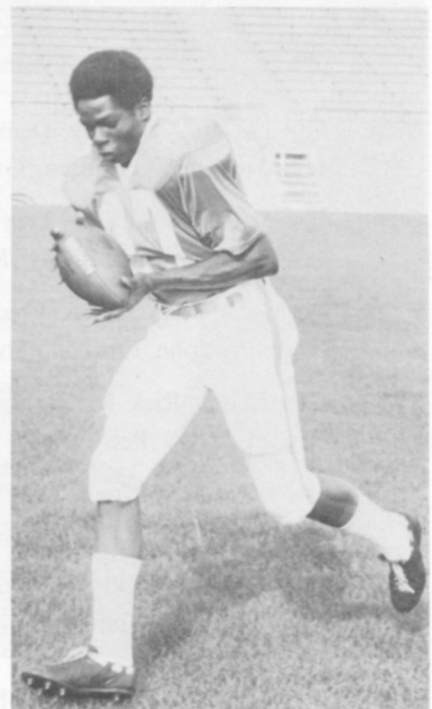


TERRY YOUNG, 6-7, 226-pound junior defensive tackle from Green Bay, Wis. Starting right tackle for the Falcons, he has been improving every game. Has thrown seven opponents for losses, the best mark on the team, and is the fifth leading tackler. The tallest player to ever play Falcon football, he saw only limited action last fall. During last winter he was a sports announcer for the cadet radio station.

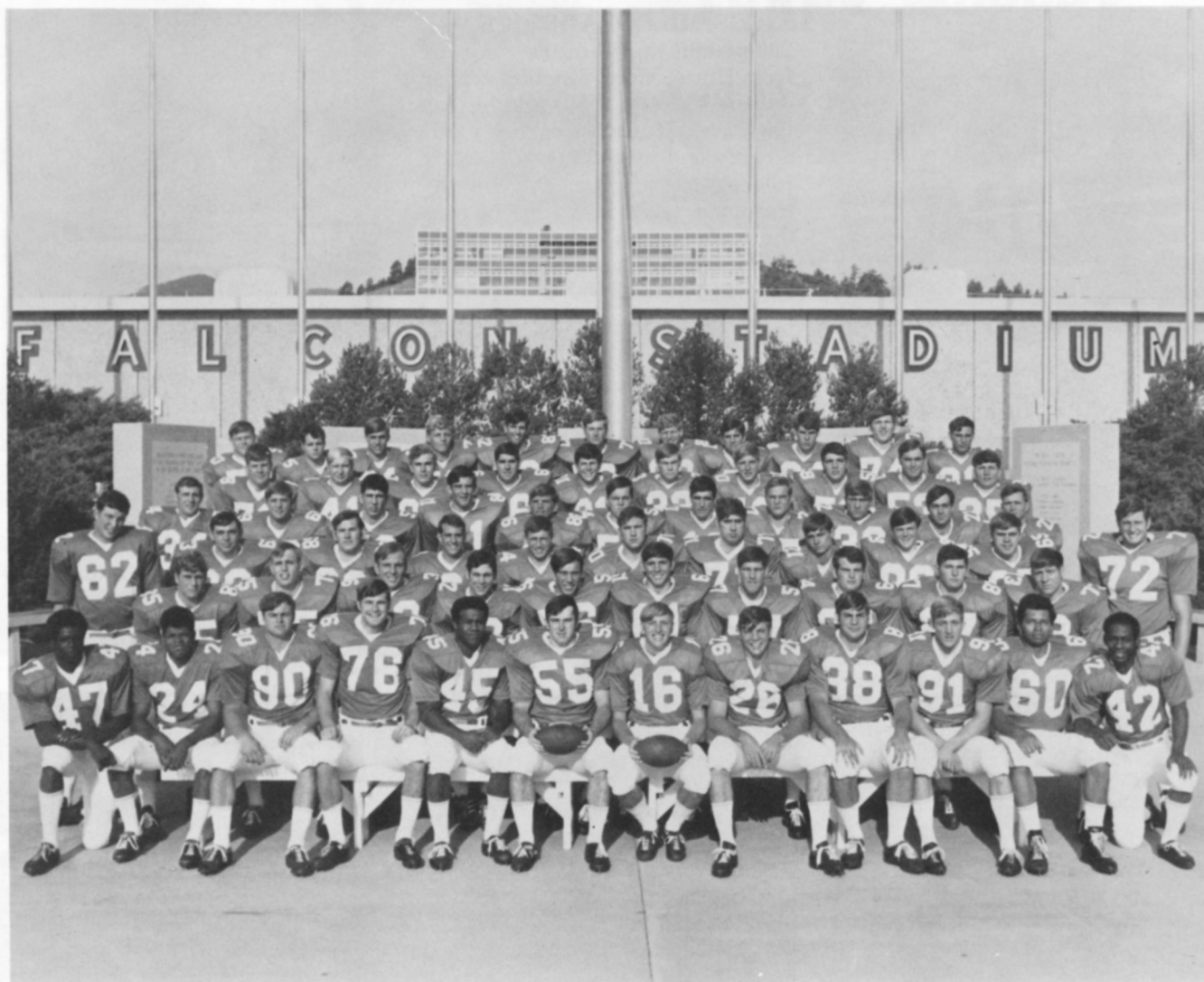


RAY WILD, 6-2, 183-pound sophomore rover from Tucson, Ariz. Has moved into the starting rover position this year and is the fourth-leading tackler on the squad and has recovered a fumble. A quarterback last year as a freshman, he moved to the defensive backfield late in the season and showed rapid development. In high school at Salpointe in Tucson his coach was Jerry Davitch, now an offensive line coach for the Falcons.

AL BREADY, 6-1, 186-pound flanker from Cincinnati, Ohio. One of the faster players on the team, he is the reserve flanker behind the Falcons leading receiver Frank Murphy. Has caught a pass this year for ten yards and is expected to see a lot more action in 1973. Was a member of the junior varsity football squad last season. Majors in international affairs.

DAVIDSON COLLEGE

Davidson College is a four-year coeducational liberal arts college. Its ninety-three faculty members have traditionally supported an intensive academic program which is implemented through lectures, seminars, the tutorial, undergraduate research, and more recently through independent study, extended studies, and contract. Emphasis is placed upon a teaching faculty and instructional development.

Davidson is seventh among liberal arts colleges in America in Rhodes Scholarships (17), first among colleges in the Southeast receiving Woodrow Wilson Fellowships and Marshall Scholarships, and high in Danforth, Rockefeller Brothers, Thomas J. Watson, NCAA, and similar prestigious and remunerative advanced study grants. It is in the top three per cent of all private colleges in the percentage of its graduates listed in *Who's Who in America*. Among colleges and universities in America, it ranks in the top twenty in the number of National Merit Scholars enrolled in relation to size of the student body.

In a systematic study of 206 private liberal arts colleges with student enrollments of 1,000 or more, Davidson ranked thirteenth and was the only college in the Southeast in the top fifteen. Rankings were based on faculty compensation, student scholastic aptitude test scores, expenditures per student, and similar criteria.

Although its enrollment for more than a decade was stabilized at about 1,000 men, there are now more than 1,100 and it is expected that with the development of coeducation the enrollment in the next decade may increase to about 1,500. Exchange programs with several women's colleges have been in progress since 1970, and in 1973 it awarded its first degree to a coed.

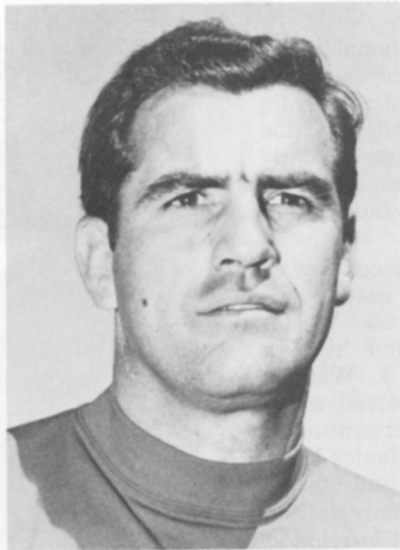
The first classes were convened at Davidson College March 1, 1837. Its first diplomas were awarded in 1840, and today it boasts about twelve thousand living alumni.

Traditionally, about 75 per cent of each graduating class pursues advanced study in business and the professions, principally at the finest graduate schools in the eastern half of the United States. More of Davidson's alumni have become college professors with earned doctoral degrees than any other college in the South, and forty-seven have become college presidents. Approximately fourteen hundred alumni are now physicians, surgeons and dentists, and an almost equal number have entered into the Christian ministry. Law, engineering, business and other professions occupy many more alumni.

The "Falconaires" have recorded their own musical arrangements in Hollywood, California and Las Vegas, Nevada. Most of their music is written by their own arranging staff.

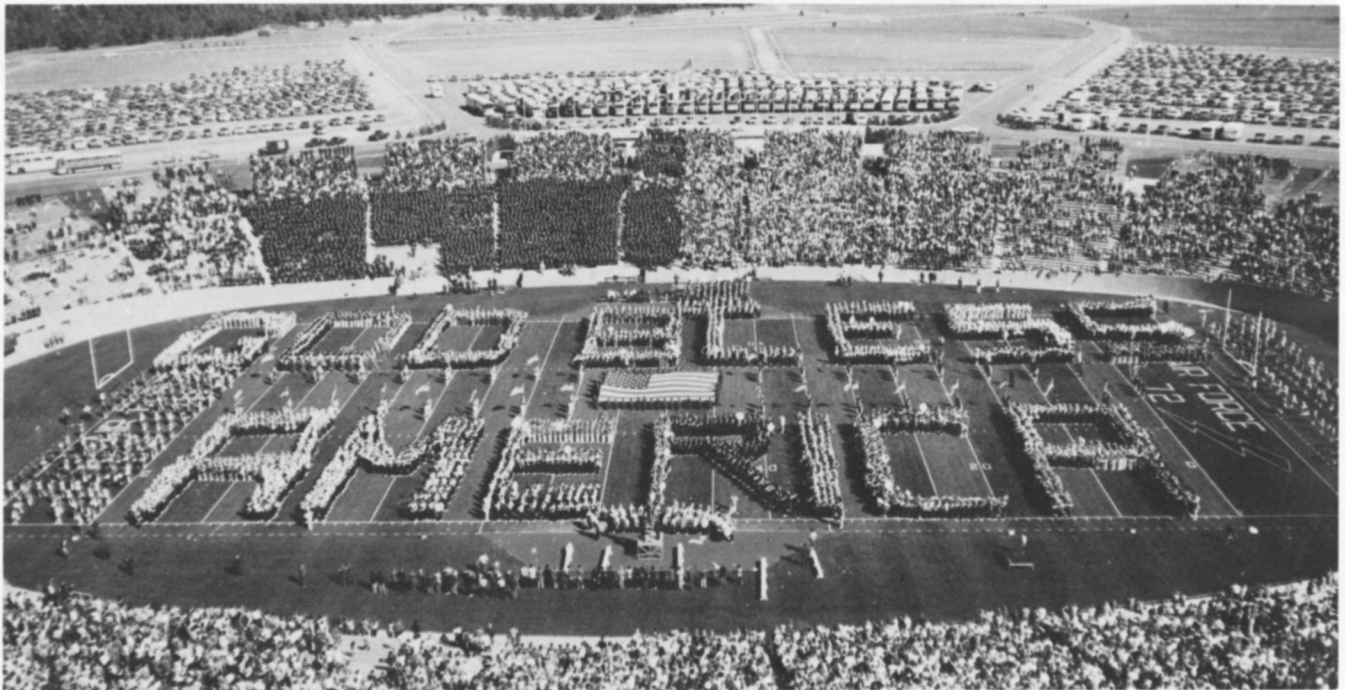

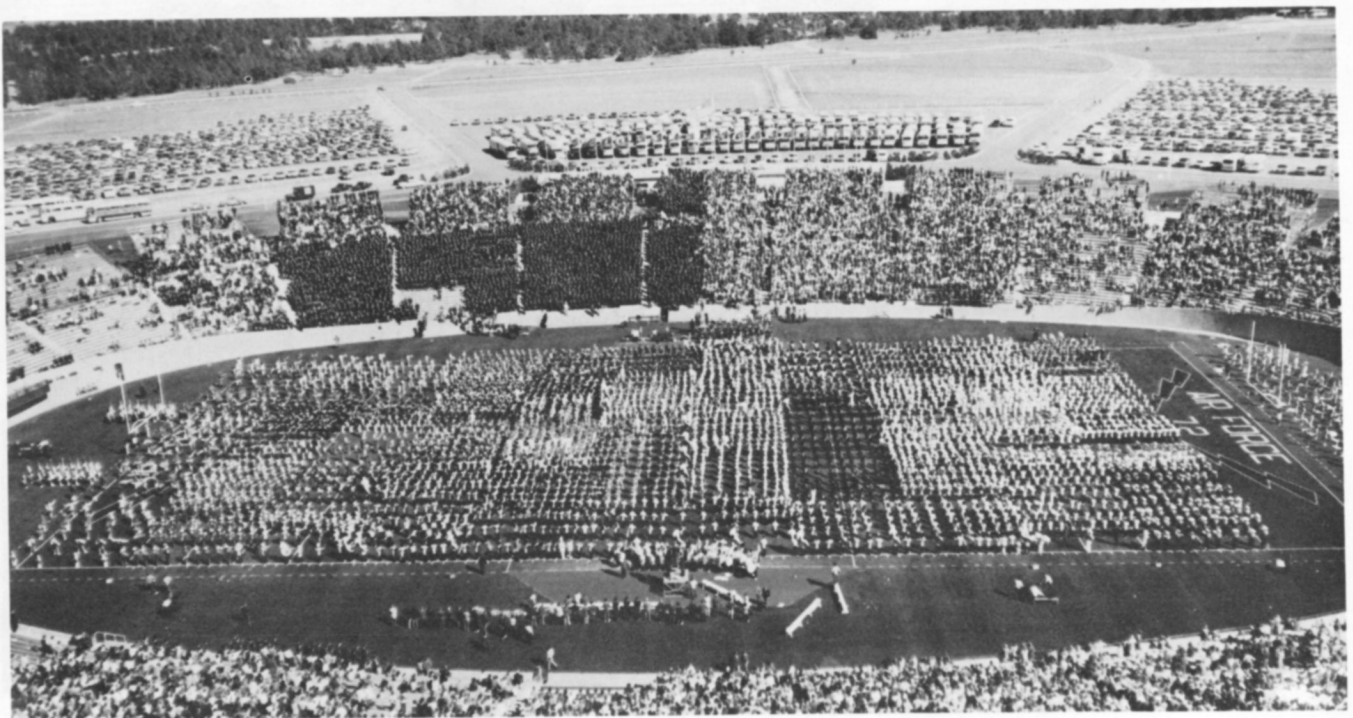

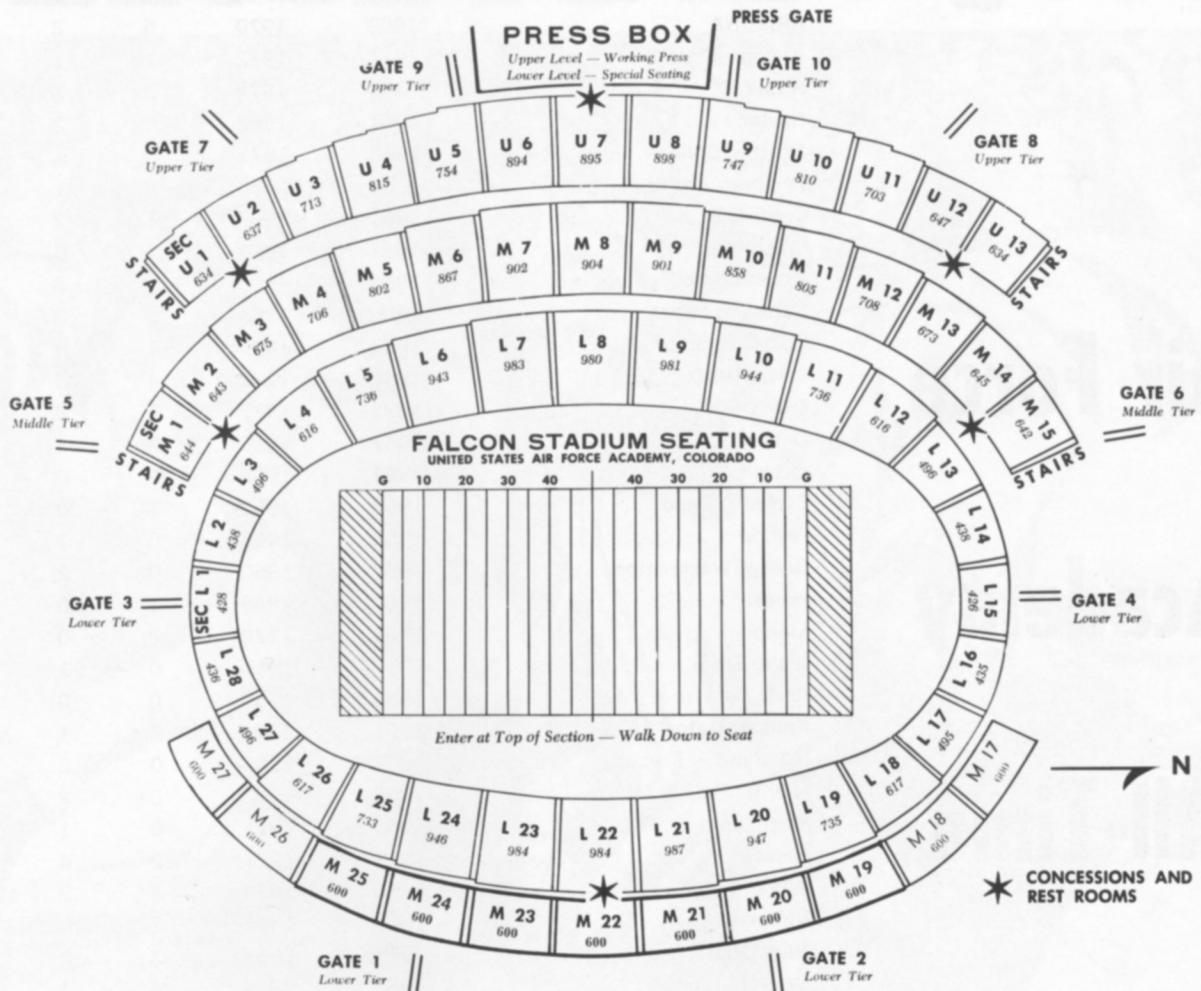

Stadium Information

LOST AND FOUND

If you lose an article while attending a game at Falcon Stadium, check at the main ticket office in the east building or the main concessions office on the top tier of the west side. If you find an article in the stadium area, please turn it in to any of the concession stands, the main ticket office or the main concessions office.

FIRST AID

Trained medical personnel are in attendance at all Air Force home games. In case of any emergency, report it immediately to the head usher in your portal. There are two first aid rooms and two first aid stations located in Falcon Stadium. The rooms are located in the east side building and on the third tier of the west side, directly under the press box. The stations are located off the walkways of the first and second tiers in the vicinity of the 50-yard line.

EMERGENCY CALLS

Individuals expecting emergency calls should file their portal section, row and seat number with the command post, located in the east side building. Office number is 472-1151. A call number will then be issued. **No special announcements are made over the public address system except in cases of grave emergency. Please do not request this service needlessly.**

STADIUM FACTS

For natural beauty, Falcon Stadium is hard to surpass. Built into the base of the Rampart Range mountains, the modern facility also is one of the most functional sports structures in the country.

The concrete structure, built in a natural bowl, has 49,068 permanent seats and can hold up to 50,000 spectators with additional temporary bleachers. There is one level of seats on the east side and three tiers of seats on the west, each serviced by two concession stands and restroom areas. All seats are within easy walking distance of the 9,610-vehicle capacity parking lot which surrounds the stadium on three sides.

The stadium is easily accessible from divided U. S. Interstate 25 and the Academy's Stadium Boulevard which leads directly to the parking lot. There is also ample parking space for 300 commercial busses, and a rail siding is located just a few hundred yards from the bowl for special trains.

In each Falcon football program for the remainder of the home season, fans are invited to identify famous games and players from Air Force history. This week's quiz features two pictures.

The picture above shows one of the top Falcon athletes of all time in action against UCLA in 1963. In that contest against the Bruins, Air Force won 48-21, en route to a 7-4 season and a berth in the Gator Bowl against North Carolina. Our Falcon star was outstanding that day, rushing for 136 yards, completing 9 of 13 passes for another 122 yards, while rushing for three scores and passing for another.

The picture at the right shows two famous athletes in action during the 1962 Air Force-Oregon game. Number 20, making the tackle for the Ducks, had an outstanding collegiate career but has since gone on to All-Pro fame in the National Football League, and still wears the number 20. Number 47 of the Falcons achieved special notice for his exploits earlier in the 1962 year. For those fans who can't come up with the names of these three athletes, the answers are printed below.



ANSWER

Now on the football staff of the Air Force Academy, the athlete in action against UCLA is Capt. Terry Isaacson, the only Falcon athlete to ever earn All-America honors in two sports, wrestling and football. Now a member of the NFL Dallas Cowboys, number 20 for Oregon is Mel Renfro, a perennial all-star cornerback. The Falcons number 47 is John Lorber, who had the distinction of scoring the first touchdown at Falcon Stadium in the 1962 season opener against Colorado State.

Swimmers, Cagers Strike Gold in Moscow

It resembled the United Nations, only on a slightly smaller scale.

As such, it contained many of the elements of that international body: friendship, conflict, cooperation, confrontation and competition.

"It" was Universiade-73, Moscow . . . World University Games, 1973, Moscow, USSR.

AMF Supports U. S. Team

For the first time since the United States began participating in the Games in 1965 it supplied a full complement of men's and women's teams. This was made possible largely by a \$100,000 contribution from AMF, Inc., manufacturer of leisure time and industrial equipment. Sponsoring organization of the American teams is the United States Collegiate Sports Council (USCSC), composed of elements from the National Collegiate Athletic Association, National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, National Junior College Athletic Association and the American Association of Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

Some 3,500 men and women representing 67 countries converged on the Soviet capital for 10 days of intense competition Aug. 15-25. The American delegation of 290 athletes and officials was second only to the host Russians (298) in size. Jordan's one representative was the smallest contingent.

Results of the competition and the international incidents which were precipitated served to focus more attention than ever before on the World University Games. An estimated 1,000 press, radio and television correspondents were on hand to report the events.

The superb Russian athletes made a run-away of the quest for medals, capturing a total of 134 awards, 68 gold, 36 silver and 30 bronze. America's runner-up total was 53, 19-16-18.

The U. S., traditionally a power in

track and field, failed to win a gold medal until the next to last event, the 4 x 100 relay for men. The quartet of Steve Whatley (Alabama), Wordell Galbreath (New Mexico Junior College), Larry Brown (Essex County College) and Steve Riddick (Norfolk State) set a new World Games record of 39.1 for the event.

The only other American gold in track came in the disputed 4 x 400 relay for men. The Russians finished first in the event; but on the second lap, America's Darwin Bond (Tennessee) was fouled and a protest was filed. The protest was upheld, giving Bond and his teammates Mark Lutz (Kansas), Ronald Jenkins (Texas Southern) and Dennis Schultz (Oklahoma) the gold medal.

But with the advent of the swimming, the American gold rush began. U.S. swimmers captured 31 medals, 16 gold awards, enroute to seven Games records. Three individuals won three gold medals apiece: Allen Poucher of Southern California (200-meter butterfly, 100-meter butterfly and 4 x 100-meter medley relay), David Johnson of New Mexico (200-meter backstroke, 100-meter backstroke and 4 x 100-meter medley relay) and Sally Tuttle of Ventura College (100-meter freestyle, 4 x 100-meter freestyle relay and 4 x 100-meter medley relay).

Cager's Revenge

The upbeat continued in basketball as the Yank men doggedly pursued their quest for revenge of the loss to the Russians last year in Munich. Only one American, Tom Burleson of North

Carolina State, was on the team that was stung with the controversial 51-50 loss. Six of the Soviets had been there.

The Americans, led by the superlative David Thompson of North Carolina State, demolished Russian hopes of continued cage domination with a 75-67 victory; and, as they say, it wasn't that close. Thompson was chosen the outstanding player in the Games.

This accomplishment by America, and the dazzling performances of the other talented athletes, finally overshadowed the disturbing political overtones that intruded into the Games. Forgotten, but not completely, were the confinement of the American delegation to Moscow University because of a credentials snafu, the near disastrous riot at the USA-Cuba basketball game that brought the wrath of fans and officials alike down on the Cubans and the continual harassment of the Israeli teams during competition. Forgotten—but not completely.

George Killian of the National Junior College Athletic Association and American chef de mission summed up the experience: "The Soviets worked extremely hard on the Games. The competitions were well organized. Our biggest problems were the language barrier, and what we in the States would call too much red tape (no pun intended). One of the greatest accomplishments to come out of the Games was the opening of the Soviet borders to thousands of people at one time. This is bound to have an effect on U.S.-Soviet relations, in sports as well as in other areas."

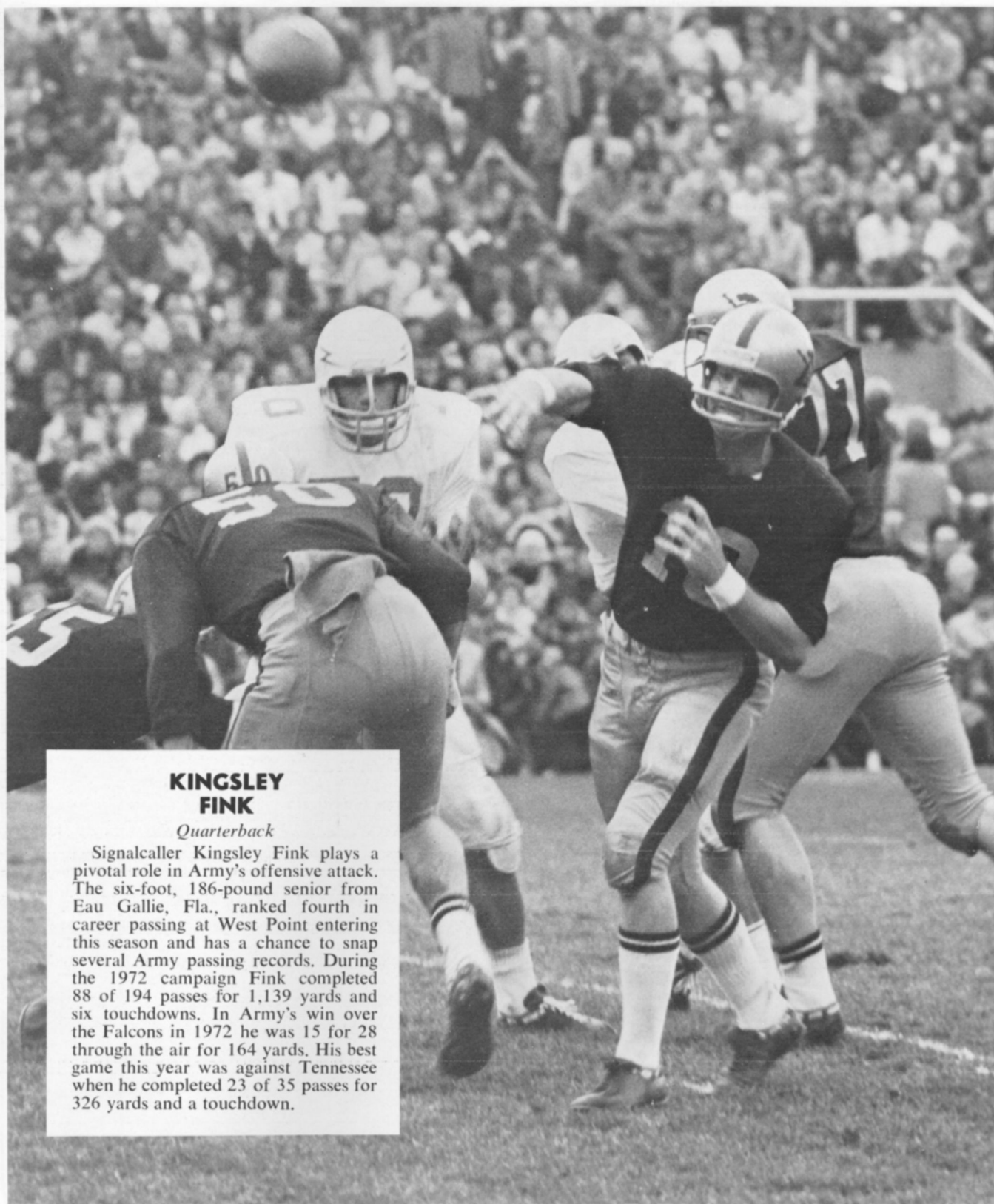

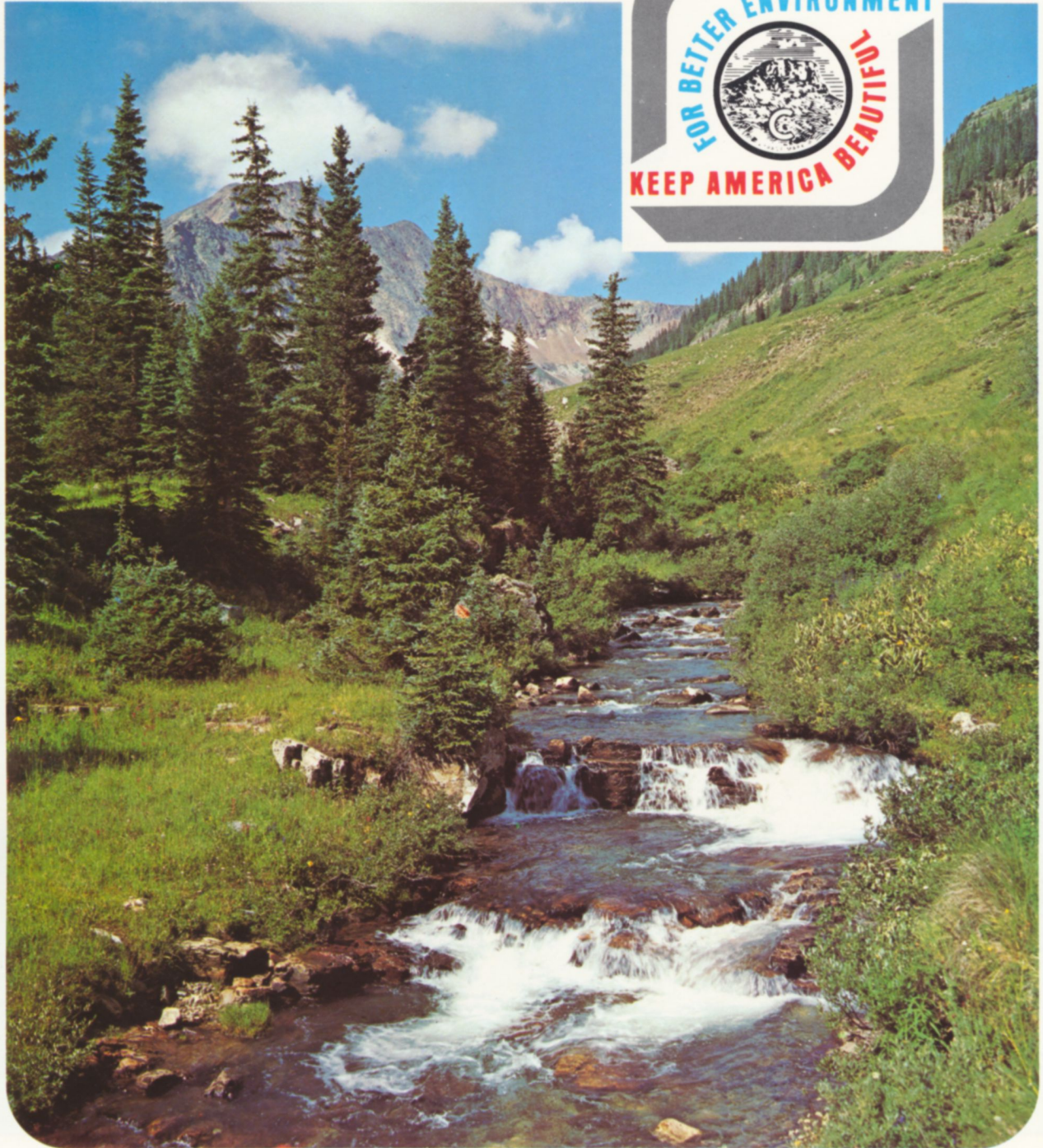
